## PASTOR POINTS VOTER'S DUTIES

In a sermon on Luke 19:41 the pastor of Zion Lutheran church yesterday morning made extensive references to "Civic Righteousness." Basing his remarks on Christ's lamentations over Jerusalem when he entered that city for the last time, just previous to crucifixion, he said in part: "The real cause of the tears of Christ must be sought in the realm of spiritual things, rather than in the political and material misfortunes they foreshadowed. To Christ it was the unrepenting, sin-loving and self-righteous attitude of the nation that caused him to lament. But those of us who live in a time—after Titus the Roman general laid siege to and utterly destroyed Jerusalem just 40 years later we know of the million corpses covering the ground and the desolations and undecipherable scenes of that most awful destruction in the history of wars, to us the significance of Christ's tears must also have a political, a material bearing. The corruption, deceitfulness and dishonesty of the nation resulted in its own annihilation, just like low motives and despising of truth and honesty always result in disaster eventually. "If Jesus Christ were to appear in the flesh in our land now and visit our cities it is more than likely that he would enter the majority of them weeping. It is true that municipal reform has made great strides during the last decade, but individually the politician, the businessman and the social leader was slow to adopt the new standard of respect for the right and regards of our fellow men, that is sweeping the land. Step by step the abuses against God, and man have had to be crowded off the stage of American life, in-so-far as any victories have been won.

**Local Date Pointed Out.**  
"There was a time when the municipal graft was universal and considered unavoidable. Business as a whole hoping to profit winked at it. When the tide of public sentiment swept through the cities politicians found they could not afford it for disaster came to many as for instance in San Francisco, Pittsburgh, New York and thousands of other cities and will come to others. It was the private citizen through his sense of righteousness who alone could make these reforms. In view of this fact it is inexcusable on the part of so many citizens of La Grande to fail to exercise their right to vote for so important a change in the government of the city as wrought by a commission form, whether they think the new or old form the best, or whether they think this city needs reform now or not. Your vote is not only a privilege but a duty in so far as it is your public profession of the standards you consider right. By it you help create this powerful thing called public opinion.

"There are also other means than the vote by which every resident in the city can wield an influence. Your conduct in public, your patronage, your conversation, all are elements that enter into the making of the standards of a city. To illustrate; a moving picture man of a neighboring city recently said that the shows were raising the standards of the pictures and attractions as fast as public suggestive things sometimes still produced, what an indictment against the public! I believe this is a slander and instead of showing a depraved public, it merely shows that in the absence of art, sensation will find a following. If morally irresponsible and the transient pack a lewd theater, that does not for a moment constitute a verdict on public sentiment. We all shudder at the thought of a child being run over, yet all will run to see it when it happens, but this curiosity does not constitute a demand for misfortunes. There has been a persistent murmur of dissatisfaction with the suggestiveness of some of the productions lately given in larger cities. It remains to be seen if public sentiment of mothers and fathers and prominent citizens will tolerate increasingly undesirable shows."

The Lutheran church has taken on new life and activity during the month of September. The Luther League has commenced to hold regular devotional meetings every Sunday evening and the Sunday school has added two classes and as many teachers. The bible class is now under the able leadership of Mr. Mansager and Mrs. Harris Hombie has been appointed the regular organist for the Sunday school. The deacons also are working on plans for the enlarging and beautifying of the church building. With a new coat of paint and numerous other improvements it is hope interest will be created for the upkeep and continued improvement of the building among the members. Efforts are being made to arrange for a Sunday school and social hall in the basement. The congregation has lost several members through removal to other cities, and will feel greatly the loss of Mr. and Mrs. Dalton who are soon to leave, but others have come in and it is expected that the membership will be much increased during the winter.

## STUDENTS ASK HOME SUPPORT

### NEED OF SUPPORT AGAINST REFERENDUM SHOWN.

La Grande Students at State Institution United Ask Support.

Eugene, Ore., Sept. 29.—(To the Editor of Observer).—The Eastern Oregon students at the University of Oregon, take this means of expressing their regret that extension of the university's facilities has been delayed by the referendum.

We are in daily contact with conditions at the university and realize how difficult it is becoming to handle the fast increasing student body without a corresponding increase in the facilities.

The university has had no new building for seven years, and the last structure erected was a library. The appropriations under the referendum call for \$100,000 for a new administration and class room building and \$75,000 to make extensions and repairs to four other buildings. We know this added room is greatly needed, the attendance at the university having doubled since the last new building was put up.

Deady hall and Villard hall, the principal class room buildings now, were built in 1876 and 1885, respectively.

Pride in our state university and a desire to see it helped rather than hindered in becoming the greatest institution it is destined to be, able to aid thousands as it has aided us, prompts us, in convention this day assembled, to agree as follows:

Resolved, That we urge all the people of our respective communities to register without fail and to support the university on November 4th in the two matters that are so vital to its continued progress, and

Resolved, That we view with sorrow and apprehension the misuse of the referendum against the just cause of higher education by individuals whom we believe to be actuated by motives of private and personal malice, and by others who are well disposed but who have been misled and misinformed.

### Good Roads Campaign Starts.

Denver, Sept. 25.—Commercial and good roads organizations of Colorado today started a movement preparatory to launching a general western campaign for the permanent improvement of roads, simultaneously with the entry into Colorado of a large party of automobilists from St. Joseph and Kansas City, Missouri. The motorists are inspecting the Rock Island highway from St. Joseph to Denver. They are placing markers at all cross-roads and forks between the two cities. The highway at Colby, Kansas, joins the Golden Belt route from Kansas City and from Colby follows that route to Denver. The motorists left St. Joseph September 23.
