EDUCATION AT STATE FAIR.

Salem, Ore., Sept. 29.—Industrial education and liberal education were both subjected to acute analysis and critical survey here today by Dr. George Rebec, on the first day of the University of Oregon educational symposium at the state fair.

Dr. Rebec is the educational authority who with Professor John Dewey, of the University of Chicago, was called to Hawaii after the downfall of the monarchy, to advise on the establishment of a modern school system. After years as professor of philosophy at the University of Michigan, and studies which caused him to spend a long period in Germany, Italy, Greece and other countries, he settled on a pear orchard near Medford, and later was induced to take charge of a branch of the University of Oregon's extension work.

"There are different views of education," said Dr. Rebec, "but none is of any use until we know what we are educating for. We need to know our goal; before we can accomplish anything we must know what ends we wish to attain. Different ideals call for different kinds of education."

"One ideal is conformity. Any type of Oriental education, for instance, aims to subjugate the individual and make him conform to the inherited social system. To be conventionalized is the chief virtue. Again, if the whole aim of life is a civilization of a purely industrial type, education would try to produce an effective industrial unit, conventionalize the individual into a cog in the industrial system. And there is good in this."

"On the other hand, in a society in which free individuality and fullness and completeness of human personality is the chief end and value in life, education will strive by every possible means and by every hazard to realize this character and privilege for its members. In short, what constitutes an education is entirely relative."

"Therefore, here in America before we can decide on what we can do in the schools, we must decide what we are after as a people. Is it prosperity, or is it humanity, or some judicious mixture of the two? Are our industries made for man or man for our industries? All American history

testifies to the fact that while we are a hard headed, practical people, and do believe in material efficiency, yet at bottom our inborn national passion has always been for man as man."

Man Killed at Huntington.

Huntington, Sept. 29.—A man by the name of McHenrage, an employee of the railroad on the O. S. L., was instantly killed by No. 18 on his way home. He had been in town buying supplies, coming in on a speeder. It is reported that he stayed until quite late before starting for home. The train leaving here about 1:30 a. m. overtook and killed him. He leaves a wife and family on the Idaho side of the river.

Only about 5,000,000 acres of alfalfa are grown in the United States today, as compared with about 50,000,000 acres of timothy and clover—46,000,000 acres of wheat, and more than 100,000,000 acres of corn. Of the 5,000,000 acres under alfalfa, only 218,000 acres of this crop is grown east of the Mississippi river.

As you will note by referring to the chart, nearly 1,000,000 acres of alfalfa, or one-fifth of the entire area, is grown in the state of Kansas alone. In the rank of states growing alfalfa, Nebraska is second; Colorado, third; California, fourth. The great Corn Belt states such as Iowa, Illinois and Wisconsin, rank very low in the production of alfalfa—and it is in the Corn Belt states, therefore, that the need for growing alfalfa is found to be the most urgent.
