\$50,000 On Umatilla Project.

Hermiston, Or., Sept. 29.—The reclamation service has commenced the annual fall work of extending the cement lining of the canals and ditches of the Umatilla project. More will be done than usual this fall. A wire was received yesterday authorizing the lining of several miles of the big feed canal that supplies the water from the Umatilla river for the Cold Springs reservoir. The canal is thirty feet wide and three miles of distance along a hillside will be lined with concrete this fall. The water in the system will be turned off October 1, when many of the small laterals and ditches throughout the project will be lined. Some drainage work will also be done and according to the reclamation officials, over \$50,000 will be spent during the next three months which will give employment to all idle men and teams on the project.
