Road Builders Meet. Detroit, Mich., Oct. 1.—More than 5,000 of the nation's road builders from every section of the United States and Canada, as well as representatives from countries across the Atlantic are in Detroit today to participate in the third annual American Road congress, held under the auspices of the American Highway association, the American Automobile association, and the Michigan State Good Roads association. Twenty-seven auxiliary associations devoted to the improvement of highways are holding their annual conventions in connection with the road congress. Before the end of the week, officials of the congress say, 10,000 delegates and visitors will be here.

Great interest has been shown in the address delivered by Secretary of Agriculture David Houston, representing President Wilson. The secretary outlined the policy which the administration probably will adopt this fall in regard to the good roads movement. Officials of the congress believed it would include an announcement of a tentative plan for the giving of national financial aid for the actual construction of highways. It is the first time since the construction of the famous Cumberland road, over a century ago, that the United States gov-

ernment has actively participated in road building.

Roads as the medium of commerce, as the connecting links between communities, as the means of social intercourse and as a great influence for the spread of civilization are being discussed during the week by the country's experts. Among the speakers are the heads of every state highway department in the union, or their representatives. The exhibit of road making machinery, road materials, cement and bricks, and various devices for road improvement, displayed on the second floor of the Wayne Gardens, is an interesting side-line of the conventions. Thirty-five thousand square feet of floor space has been given over to this exposition, and 75 per cent of all the industries identified with road building or road maintenance are represented. The biggest and most notable of the exhibits is that conducted by the United States government. Two series of miniature models is shown by the public roads division of the department of agriculture. The first shows the development of road building from the early Roman period to the present day. The other series shows all modern types of road, such as sand-clay, gravel, macadam, brick and concrete. Included in the government's exhibits are models of bridges, culverts and drainage structures, as well as electrically operated models of rollers and crushers. The government display is pronounced the most complete road exhibit ever made. The fight for the honor of entertaining the road congress in its 1914 gathering started with the opening session when delegations from Atlanta, New Orleans, Milwaukee, Denver, Boston, and Washington, D. C. got busy to influence votes. The place for next year's meeting will be selected Saturday, on the closing day of the convention. Early indications were that either New Orleans or Atlanta would be favored.
