POULTRY MEN APPEALED TO

SUPERINTENDENT OF POULTRY
DEPARTMENT WRITES.

Great Benefits Derived by Poultry-
men Explained in Letter.

To urge Union county poultry rais-
ers to become actively interested in
the coming state fair, Chas. E. Perry
of May Park, writes from Salem,
where he is superintendent of poultry
at the state fair. He says:

Will you kindly allow me letter
space in your paper to call the at-
tention of all persons interested in
poultry, to the Union county fair that
will be held next week at La Grande,
and if it is possible interest them to
the extent of making an exhibit. I
doubt if many appreciate the benefit
that would be derived from it. First
it will help make a good fair, second
it will let those interested know what
you have and will help you sell your
stock at good prices.

Since living in La Grande I have
tried to influence to raise purely
bred poultry and in many cases I
have succeeded. Now I wish to say
there is no better way to tell people
what you have than to make an ex-
hibit at the fair.

I often hear the remark: "I could
not win a prize." Should everyone
act on this principle we should have
no fair. I think a person not only
owes it to himself to make the best
exhibit possible, but to the county fair
which it will help to make a success.
I have personally made many sales at
good prices from the exhibits I have
made at the county fair and have in-
terested many others in the raising
of purely bred poultry. I am this
week at the state fair at Salem as
superintendent of the poultry depart-
ment and I wish that you all might see
the poultry displays here. I think
that we have the finest lot of poul-
try ever shown at our state fair and
the interest in these exhibits is in-
creasing every year, especially in the
children's department. There are on
exhibit here over 1200 birds, coming
from all parts of the state and coun-
try. I have an exhibit and I am pleas-
ed to say that the breeders have been
told that La Grande is on the map,
as I have been successful in the tak-
ing of my share of the blue ribbons.
I shall be home with my birds to ex-
hibit and to take personal charge of
the poultry department at the Union
county fair and I shall appreciate it
very much if all will help me to make
a success of this department. We
have one of the best judges engaged
that could be secured and I assure you
we will all get what belongs to us,
when the prizes are awarded.

Get your birds on the ground by
Tuesday and I shall be there to look
after them.
