BOLT SCOUTED.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 2.—(Special)—If anyone is really inclined to take seriously the standpat talk about Colonel Roosevelt being the republican nominee for the Presidency in 1916 let him contemplate for a moment the resolution adopted by the republican state convention of New York the other day denouncing the progres-

sive proposals to make the recall applicable to judges as well as to other elective officers and for the so-called review of judicial decisions. There is a genuine and unmistakable reactionary ring to the language of this republican resolution. It says:

"The republican party condemns all proposals to intimidate judges in the discharge of their duty by threats of a recall in case of an unpopular decision and all proposals to nullify the decisions of the courts at the will of a temporary popular authority through the recall of decisions."

The proposition for the recall of judicial decisions is Colonel Roosevelt's own, first enunciated by him in the famous character of democracy spread fore the Ohio constitutional convention in Columbus in February, 1912. This proposal, together with the proposal to make the recall applicable to judges, Colonel Roosevelt has supported upon nearly every platform from which he has spoken in the last 19 months.

Thus, unconsciously, and no doubt without in the least intending to interfere with the deep laid schemes of those republicans who have been assiduously spreading the "Roosevelt for 1916" these New York reactionaries have furnished in one paragraph of their platform the complete and final answer to all of it.

GOOD ROADS TOPIC

Detroit, Oct. 2.—Predictions that within five years the United States government will have appropriated large sums of money for the construction of thousands of miles of new road and the repair of many of the most traveled roads now in use, were made by speakers today at the Third annual American Road congress which is being held under the auspices of the American Highway association, the American Automobile association and the Michigan State Good Roads association. The present congress is the most important and largely attended of any previous one. The following auxiliary organizations are participating in the deliberations:

National Association of Road Machinery and Material manufacturers; American Bar association, (special committee); American Bankers association; Lincoln Highway association; Travelers Protective association; Que-

bec-Miami International Highway association; Omaha, Lincoln, Denver, Good Roads association; Arkansas Good Roads and Drainage association; Greater Colorado Highway association; Georgia Federation of Road authorities; Illinois Highway Improvement association; Indiana Good Roads association; Kansas State Good Roads association; Kentucky Good Roads association; Minnesota Roadmakers association; New York Road Builders association; North Carolina Good Roads association; North Carolina Good Roads association; Virginia Road Builders association; West Virginia Road of Trade Good Roads Committee and Wisconsin Highway Commissioners association.

Confessor Awaits Sentence.

New York, Oct. 2.—Dr. Earnest Muret, dentist whose arrest on a charge of violating the Sullivan anti-fire arm law, followed the arrest and confession of Rev. Father Hans Schmidt, Roman Catholic priest, to having murdered and dismembered the body of Anna Aumuller, today came up for sentence. Dr. Muret pleaded guilty to the charge but it was thought probable today that his sentence would be postponed until Federal authorities have completed the case of counterfeiting against him. A complete counterfeiter's equipment was found in a flat rented jointly by Muret and the defrocked Catholic priest.
