Guy L. Lindsay Exonerated.

Portland, Or., Oct. 6.—Federal Judge Bean today directed the jury to return a verdict of not guilty on every count in the case of the Federal government against Guy L. Lindsay, former cashier of the Citizens' National bank of Baker. The result of the case is a clear vindication of the defendant, the court holding that the evidence showed that the transactions involved in the case, which Lindsay was accused of illegally promoting, had the knowledge and approval of the directors of the bank, and were done for the benefit of it out fraud.

The outcome of the case was eagerly awaited in Baker, owing to the prominence of the defendant and the fact that Attorney James H. Nichols of Baker, was head counsel for Mr. Lindsay and opened the case for him. He was aided in the defense by Attorneys Jay Bowerman, former governor of Oregon, and C. W. Fulton.
