Lafayette to Amend Charter. Lafayette, Or., Oct. 6.—An effort to raise the interest payable on municipal bonds, from five per cent to six per cent, by charter amendment, will be made at the regular election to be held the first Monday in December. The charter now provides a limit of five per cent and because of this the water bonds have remained unsold. It is believed that bond buyers would take the issue if it paid six per cent. The petition necessary to put the amendment on the ballot has been properly circulated.
