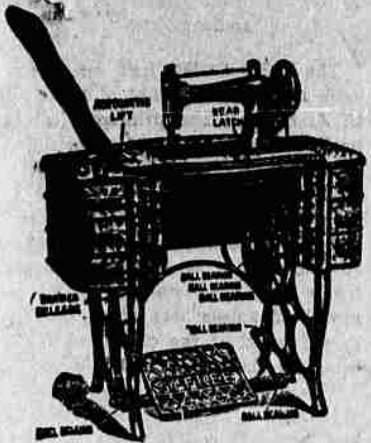

A Few Steers Being Sold at \$8.00 in Portland Yards.

Union Stock Yards, Portland, Or., Oct. 9.—Trade was fairly active yesterday and good prices were secured in all divisions. Steers brought a new figure when \$8.00 was reached for a couple of them. Cows also went above the high mark, \$6.90 being paid for three of them. Hog prices were not up to the average.

Metolius Work Is Finished.

Bend, Or., Oct. 6.—The force of government men which has been engaged the past summer in land classification work on the Metolius river, has been called in. The men covered a large territory and made a thorough examination of the soil and herbarium and also cruised the timber. The field notes have been taken to Portland, where they will be circulated and then presented to the officials at Washington. It is understood that the reports will be favorable to selling off the timber, and then opening the land to settlement.

Pioneer of 1853 Buried.

Eugene, Or., Oct. 7.—Mrs. Selena Parvin, one of the early pioneers of Lane County, was buried in the Pleasant Hill Cemetery Sunday beside her husband, who died a number of years ago. Mrs. Parvin died Thursday aged 78 years, at the home of her son, H. M. Parvin. Besides her son she leaves two daughters and numerous other relatives. She came across the plains from the Middle West with her husband in 1853 and had lived in Lane County ever since. She was a devoted member of the Christian church.
