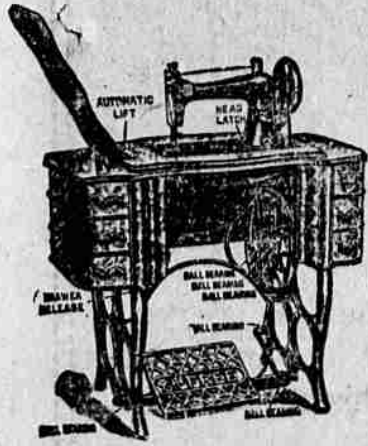

FIVE THOUSAND HEAD OF SHEEP

CHANGE HANDS.

N. C. Longfellow Will Retire From the Sheep Business at Once.

Joseph, Oct. 10.—Many Cattle and sheep sales have been made in this vicinity of late. N. C. Longfellow has sold all of his sheep—5343 head—to Jay Dobbin and Fred Falconer. Mr. Longfellow has retired from the stock business entirely, having sold all of his horses to his former partner, Bige Arnold of Imnaha.

Of the 200 head of cattle Fred Gaylord recently bought from Fred Walker, he has sold about half of the number—all cows—to Henry Mitchell. The balance are all calves, which Fred may conclude to feed this winter.

George Sallady, who recently purchased the Polk Mays cattle on Joseph creek—about 300 head and about 500 acres of range—is preparing to take charge of the cattle about the 20th of this month. During the next year George's family will reside in the Beth house in Joseph, while the children will attend school.
