GRAND JURORS FIND CHARGES

TWO OF THOSE INDICTED ARRANGED THIS MORNING.

Court Considers Plan to Attend Fair Today and Saturday.

Henry Wortman, of Elgin, was arraigned this morning on a charge of failing to provide properly for his wife and children. He was given until Tuesday to plead. It is understood that the case is to be fought bitterly. Cochran & Eberhard are attorneys for the defendant.

Charged with entering the J. D. Lynch home and removing some jewelry, a man named Courtway was arraigned this morning before Judge

Morrow. He has no attorney and was given until Tuesday to plead.

The Broughn case, in which C. H. Broughn is charged with selling insurance without a state license, which went to issue yesterday occupied the attention of the court again today. During the day it was the plan to adjourn court this afternoon and allow jurors and attorneys and witnesses to attend the fair this afternoon.

Judge Knowles will be home by Tuesday next, and Judge Morrow will return to Portland for that date. They two have "swapped" jobs during the present week.

PARKER ASSAILS SULZER.

Albany, Oct. 10.—"Morally and mentally unfit to hold office," was Judge Parker's characterization of Sulzer in a speech for the prosecution in the impeachment court. Though the governor said he did not take the stand because didn't wish to involve his wife's name in the case, Parker denounced him for having given the impression she and not he had used the contributions for the gubernatorial campaign in stock market speculation, and flaying him for "hiding behind" Attorney Perrier. The Sulzer defense, he said, knew the court was unfriendly to the governor but demanded the members respect oaths, decide the case on its merits.

generally admitted to be minor. To float the bonds, the bonded limit of the city prescribed by charter would have to be amended from 10 to 11 per cent of the assessed valuation. The assessed valuation of La Grande has materially increased since the last valuation and one per cent additional bond limit would allow the floating of

the serial bonds.

Easy Reduction Seen.

"To retire the bonds it would be necessary to create a sinking fund and interest fund with a small levy—sufficient to raise \$5,000 reduction from the principal each year, of the 20 years and the interest. The first year the interest would be an additional \$5,000 but would be reduced rapidly and in the course of a few years La Grande would have to raise but a very small sum in addition to the annual serial bond reduction of \$5,000. This sum compared to what the taxpayers would have to shoulder through the direct

taxation to reduce the indebtedness, is trivial, and furthermore, the city would annually save \$1,000 or thereabouts, in difference between six per cent interest now being paid, and the five per cent for which the Denver house offers for the bonds. Another vast saving would result through buying for cash, this item alone reaching huge sums. The scheme is so simple that it can be readily understood and has for its salient features the reduction of one per cent in interest, the easy reduction of the principal, and the elimination of extra prices for material bought for the city."
