New York, Oct. 11.—Eddie Plank won the world's championship for the Athletics when in the fifth game of the series Philadelphia annexed the fourth victory by a score of three to one. Two lone singles was the gross hitting effect of the Giants. Plank duplicated Mathewson's effort of the second game when like his veteran contemporary he weathered every storm by a superb demonstration of all those things which make for a pitching excellence. He stood the Giants on their beams end.

Crowd Cheers "Matty."
New York, Oct. 11.—In anticipation of the great game with Mathewson and Plank as opposing pitchers, the bleachers and grand stand began filling rapidly. At one time the Giants appeared on the field singly, the Athletics followed immediately in a body. The crowd gave Mathewson an ovation. The base lines were heavy and the outfield was soaked, Mack came to the Athletics' bench 10 minutes before the game.

The crowd of fans stood up and cheered him several times.

HUERTA RULES AS A DICTATOR

BOTH BRANCHES OF CONGRESS ARE SUSPENDED.

New Troubles Brew in Mexico City—Martial Law Prevailing.

His formal proclamation dissolving the national legislature announced that new senators and deputies would be chosen at the election October 26. LAST MAN'S NOMINATION FILED LAST EVENING.

Two Choices Will Prevail in view of Number Nominated.

Eight men are on the municipal ticket for commissioners of the new government in this city, the election of whom takes place October 20. The last candidate was put on the ticket last evening when the filing of the nominating petition of W. B. Sargent, for a two year term. The balance of the 14 men were not put on the ticket because in the limited time the petitions could not be circulated. The circulators met up with unexpected difficulties. No one voter can sign more than one petition for the same office, and this necessitated a very widespread canvass of signatures. The task was entirely too big for the time allotted and all petitions could not be circulated in time.

Another stumbling block in the way of prompt signatures was that only very few have registered, and unregistered people cannot sign petitions. Between the few men and women registered and the requirement that only one petition for each office may be signed by any one voter, the delay was sufficient to block the ap-

JOHN RICH IS POISON VICTIM

DEMISE OCCURS AFTER NEARLY ONE WEEK INTERVAL.

Poison Taken In Heat of Family Quarrel Claims Its Victim.

Union, Or., Oct. 11.—(Special)—John Rich died today from the effects of poison taken with suicidal intent last Sunday when after attempting to kill his family he hurried to a medicine chest and swallowed poison. The suicidal action followed family troubles which were brought to a focus after Rich had returned to his home from La Grande, where he was a machinist, and re-commenced a quarrel that caused separation some three months ago. His assault on his wife and a relative of his wife, was prevented by a son, who hit Rich with a bucket. Rich then hurried to the medicine chest and swallowed the poison. Since the act he has been kept at the city hall continually. Death came at 11:30 this morning.

Pankhurst to America.

Paris, Oct. 11.—Mrs. Pankhurst, the militant suffragette leader, sailed from Havre for the United States today on the steamer LaProvence.

Suffragettes Beat Dr. Forward.

London, Oct. 11.—Catching him just outside the gates of Holloway prison, three suffragettes pounced on Dr. A. Forward, the jail physician, and broke a rhinoceros hide whip over his shoulders. The doctor did not make any effort to defend himself. The militants hated him with especial bitterness because of his forcible feeding of many suffragettes who have been confined in the prison from time to time, under his administration.

Volturmo Burns Up Near Where The Titanic Sank

One Hundred and Thirty-six Passengers Missing--Thought Drowned

TEN OTHER STEAMERS CAME TO RESCUE AND SAVE MAJORITY OF PASSENGERS AND CREW ABOARD ILL-FATED STEAMER—BURNED FOR TWO DAYS.

Liverpool, Oct. 11.—After burning rough seas. Six boats were lowered from the burning craft but owing to the fowling of the tackle four were smashed on the Volturo's sides, and the occupants drowned. The other two reached the ocean safely. Those on board were rescued by the Carmania.

Other Ships Near.
Ten liners surrounded the charred hulk as she went down and lent what assistance they could. At a desperate risk to themselves they rescued 521 of the crew and passengers.

Young Captain In Command.
The Volturmo was commanded by Francis Inch, who won his Captain's stripes two months ago. The ship belonged to the Canadian Northern Steamship company, but was leased by the Uranium Steamship company of Holland on October 2, and sailed from Rotterdam, bound for Halifax and New York.

Fire Rages for Two Days.
The fire broke out on board on Thursday morning. From many directions many responses came immediately. The Cunard liner, Carmania, was only 70 miles away and Captain Barr ordered full steam toward the burning ship. The Cunard liner reached the scene on Thursday. The scene of the disaster is not far from the spot where the Titanic sank.

Fire In Stern.
The Volturmo was blazing furiously in its stern and rolling heavily in the

rough seas. Six boats were lowered from the burning craft but owing to the fowling of the tackle four were smashed on the Volturo's sides, and the occupants drowned. The other two reached the ocean safely. Those on board were rescued by the Carmania.

Stiff Gale Blowing During the Fire.
A howling gale was blowing over the sea Thursday when the liners Furst, Seidlitz, Latouraine, Minneapolis, Kroonland, Rapp, Honnack, Narragansett, Devonian and Czar arrived on the scene. Throughout the night these ships maneuvered in an effort to get close to the Volturmo and take off the crew and passengers.

Explosion Wrecks Deck.
At 9 o'clock Thursday night an explosion aboard the Volturmo turned the deck into a volcano, the rescuers search lights showed that the passengers wearing life belts were jumping from the boat. A dozen small boats were lowered from the rescuing boats and began the picking up of those in the waters. In the storm and darkness many undoubtedly perished.

Sinks Early Friday.
Friday the dawn of day showed the Volturmo sinking and as the gale had abated somewhat, several of the lifeboats succeeded in reaching the wreck and taking off the remaining passengers. A few minutes afterward the boat sank.

Cleveland, O., Oct. 11.—Through "mental clinics" the Cleveland hospitals are daily saving scores of men and women from suicide of the insane asylum. They are daily convincing people who come to them with the

idea that they are victims of some dangerous ailment that their physical and mental health is normal. It is a new idea—this mental surgery, but it is working.

Persons who come to the hospitals imagining there is only a dark future before them are questioned along various lines and given advice and such recommendations as a change of work, more play, change of residence or the mode of living and are sent away filled with hope and ambition. In endorsing the "mental clinics" hospital heads use the argument—"that it is cheaper to keep a person out of the hospital than to care for one in the hospital."
