## MUTTON PRICE HOLDING OWN

DEMAND IN PORTLAND IS GOOD THIS WEEK.

Chicago Too, Has a Steady Tone for Sheep—Ditto at Kansas City.

Portland, Oct. 11.—(Special)—There is a rather fair demand for all classes of mutton in the North Portland market. Little stuff is now coming forward and all old offerings have been cleaned up. While the demand is naturally best for killing stuff with lambs probably worth from \$5 to \$5.50, the market is nevertheless good for feeder stuff with lambs around \$4.25 to \$4.75 and feed weathers at \$3. There were no arrivals for the open market at North Portland during the last 24 hours, the total run of six loads being a direct shipment to the Union Meat company.

At Chicago there was a steady tone in the sheep trade for the day.

Kansas City sheep market was firm at former prices.

South Omaha sheep market ruled slow but steady.
