EGG ADVANCE IS PREDICTED

APPLE MARKET IN PORTLAND HOLDS FIRM.

Firmness Shown in prices of Onions at Portland.

Portland, Oct. 15.—(Special)—Indications are pointing strongly to a further advance in the price of fresh ranch eggs in the local market. Today the price was very firmly held at 40c a dozen, but there was only a mere sprinkling of supplies and the wants of the trade were not at all supplied. It is generally believed that an immediate advance will be forced in values and that a 42c market will succeed the present 40c market without delay. The few cases of strictly fresh eggs now coming forward could undoubtedly be sold at the higher figure even at this moment if receivers were inclined to ask the rise.

Local prices are still somewhat out of line with those ruling at other markets along the coast. Both Seattle and San Francisco are quoting higher prices than Front street. The result is that the former is receiving the bulk of the limited offerings of the Willamette valley at this time. Market for eggs at eastern and middle western centers continues to rule the highest ever known at this period for strictly fresh ranch. While the market for storage is firm, still there is a general tendency among ice house speculators to unload promptly in order to take their profits. The season for cold storage stock is now well advanced and speculators do not intend

to take too many chances with the bulk of their holdings. Peach Season Is Ending. Season for peaches is ending very fast along Front street and prices are being reduced. There are quite liberal supplies retained by the trade and the outward movement is very slow. Quality is lacking. Apple Market Rules Active. Considerable activity is showing in the market for apples. Sales are showing an increase and as a rule former high figures are being maintained. Winter bananas seem to be the exception. The price on these started too high and best offerings are today down to \$2.50 a box. Onion Prices Are Firmer. Firmer prices are showing in the market for onions today. Best red stock being quoted as high as \$2 a central while No. 1 yellow stock is snug at \$1.75 by the trade generally. Market conditions excited in the country.
