Reform Dance Hall Instituted.

Terre Haute, Ind., Oct. 15.—A "courtroom", nursery, music room and large rooms that are turned over free of charge to girl employees for dances and other evening social gatherings, are some of the features afforded to those employed at the local overall factory which has just been built here. The management has installed the recreation rooms and nursery following the adoption by the managing directors of a "unique welfare program." Mothers employed at the factory are charged five cents a day for leaving their babies in the nursery which is in charge of competent professional nurses and is also equipped with every facility for the care of the smaller kiddies who can not be left at home with safety. Other features of the "model factory" are a luncheon room where nourishing hot lunches are sold to employees at very small cost, and shower bath rooms.

The management frankly admits the innovation of running a factory along these lines was instituted as much as a purely business venture as for humanitarian reasons. Manager Frank, of the factory, declares that since the new building was erected, the company has turned out a greater quantity of far better workmanship than it ever did before in the same length of time, and that, looked at from a strictly business standpoint, the system is a tremendous success.
