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PROF. LEWIS MAY LEAVE CORVALLIS

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore., Oct. 15.—(Special).—Acting on the invitation of the Pennsylvania State college, Professor C. I. Lewis, for many years head of the horticultural department, Oregon Agricultural college, has gone on a visit of inspection made with a view to accepting a position in the Pennsylvania institution. Although the excellent work done by Professor Lewis in the college and among the fruit growers of Oregon has made his name a household word throughout the entire state, the financial inducements held out by the Pennsylvania college are considerably more attractive than those of the Oregon institution, and Professor Lewis may decide to accept the eastern position. He is offered a position as head of the horticultural department.

Although no official announcement of Professor Lewis' contemplated

withdrawal from the Oregon college has been made, news of his journey east has leaked out and already numerous letters from prominent fruit men have been received by President Kerr, asking that every thing possible be done to retain his services. In speaking of the work of Professor Lewis, President Kerr said: "Should Professor Lewis decide to go to Pennsylvania, the decision will be a severe loss to the agricultural college and to the state. His work has been one of the greatest factors in the development in this state. He has one of the best departments to be found in any college in the United States, and his knowledge of western conditions makes his services of the greatest value to the fruit industry of Oregon."

Professor Lewis will return in about a week, when his decision will probably be announced.
