OPENER FOR TWO-DAY MEET IS

Banner Card Saved Over for Today—

Yesterday afternoon the horse men who had animals at the fair grounds, put on what they intended to be the beginner of a two-day race meeting, and in that program gave two fairly interesting trotting races and two good running races. A 12-year-old boy, Dennis by name, rode Tempo Standard to first money in the five-eighths race and crowded Round and Round for first money in the half mile.

The trotting races were interesting but lacked the class of Sunday. Today, however, something exceptionally good was to have been given in harness events when Allerdaw, Oveta, Red Rock and Delmas were to have pitted their strength for the final big race of the year. The storm today, however, had other things to dictate, and once more La Grande missed a chance to see real horse racing. The news of this quartet's appearance was spreading and a big audience was assured and a banner race indicated. Similarly good horses don't often meet in a race in this section.

The mare is by Captain McKinney and dam by Alexis. She stepped a mile in 2:20 on the La Grande track without work and driven by an inexperienced driver.

Cantatrice, the handsome and speedy traveler, owned and brought here by Warren Dennis, of Idaho, was traded by Mr. Dennis to Mr. Williams for that well seasoned track horse, Major Hardy. Cantatrice has been doing excellent work this year and on a soft track showed remarkable speed, while Major Hardy is one of those substantial horses which can start every day and always finish well.

DIXON NAMED BY GOVERNOR

Popular Attorney Is Made Special
Agent and Attorney for State.

Attorney H. E. Dixon has received notice from Governor West of his appointment as special agent and attorney for the state of Oregon in an escheat case known as State vs. Hackitt Lumber company and all heirs of John O'Connor. The case involves 160 acres of ranch land southeast of Elgin with a valuation of approximately \$3,000. In all escheat cases the governor of a state appoints an attorney to assist the prosecuting attorney in handling the case, as the work in such cases is too voluminous to take up the time of the regular state machinery. Mr. Dixon was appointed by the governor a short time and the state will at once proceed in the regular manner of handling the escheat matters.

PAT BUYS SNAKES.

Perhaps the greatest thing of public interest which she will give will be her dramatic reading of "King Rene's Daughter," slated for Tuesday evening, November 25. During the convention she will bring messages of deep importance more especially to the teachers.

Parent-Teachers' Union Forming.
Still another feature of the convention will be the organization of active work in the Parent-Teachers' association. To get this system of co-operation with schools by parents into active organization throughout the eastern half of the state is the motive of the heads of the association. Mrs. Stella Ingle, president; Mrs. A. E. Ivanhoe, secretary, and Mrs. Nellie Neill, treasurer, all of this city and all members of the executive committee, have launched a definite plan for this department. Dr. Joseph Shaffer of the Eugene university will deliver the principal address along this line of education on Wednesday afternoon. This association of parents and teachers has come to be extremely important to school work and for the first time in several years it is to receive its merited space on the program.

Accommodation Plans Mature.
La Grande will have to open her doors to the teachers. The La Grande Commercial club has shouldered the problem of accommodations and Secretary Joe Williamson has already commenced to devise plans for properly handling the half-thousand people. The hotels will be overtaxed of course, and it will fall upon the residents of La Grande to display her famous hospitality. Every person that will have a room, or rooms, or room and board available that week, should notify Secretary Williamson or Mrs. Ivanhoe as soon as possible as it is necessary that ample reservations be made. The Commercial club members will meet the delegates and see to their proper "delivery" at residences and hotels. It is a huge task and the officials will need co-operation from the rank and file. The principal question to date is to secure an early listing of available rooms and boarding places.

BAND CONCERT AND DANCE.

November 6th Time Set for Big Time
In the Rex Dance Hall.

La Grande's band will open the winter season with one of its popular indoor concerts and dances in Rex dance hall on November 6th. The band is preparing a special program for this occasion and it will be a burst of winter music from the first number until the close. The Rex hall is now being laid with hardwood floors which will make an ideal place to dance. "The dance is not the only feature of this first band event," said Prof. Haines this morning, "for we will give a first class concert for the benefit of all those who do not dance. All well wishers of the band and lovers of music are invited."

Earthquake on Snake River.
Huntington, Or., Oct. 15.—A slight earthquake was noticeable mostly on the other side of Snake river in the Seven Devils district yesterday afternoon but was not felt in this city, although according to reports the tremor, which was of about a minute's duration, caused consternation at Landore and Cuprum, Ballard's Landing and other places. The reports are meager. However, it is believed no damage resulted, houses being slightly rocked and the people pretty well frightened. The shock was also noticed at Homestead on the Oregon side of the river.

Old inhabitants say that a severe shock occurred 35 years ago and a slight one was recorded four or five years ago, but as in the present case they were slight and caused no damage.

wearing naval uniform, and the latter that of the Seaforth Highlanders, of which he is colonel-in-chief. Royal bridegrooms have no best man, but the bride who drove from Portman Square with her mother, the Princess Royal, and her uncle, the King of Norway, had eight bridesmaids. They included Princess Mary, King George's only daughter; Princess Patricia, the bridegroom's sister, Princess Maud, the bride's sister; Princess Mary of Teck, Lady Mary Cecil, daughter of the Marquis of Salisbury. Several tiny pages in satin court suits bore her train. Among them were Prince John, King George's youngest son, and Crown Prince Olaf of Norway.

It was 11:45 when the bride arrived amid a storm of cheering from the vast crowds in the vicinity of the palace. The groom was awaiting her at the altar, and in a few moments King George and Queen Mary, who drove over from Buckingham palace without escort, arrived. The King, who was in field marshal's uniform, gave his niece away, and as soon as the nuptial knot was tied by the archbishop, the royal party adjourned to the registry where the register, an imposing purple, gilt-edged book reserved exclusively for royal weddings, was signed. King George and about forty royalists and officials, signed immediately after the bride and bridegroom, and the whole party then proceeded to the banqueting hall where the wedding breakfast was served.

The bride today wore a simple gown of white and pale blue silk embroidered with sprigs of white heather, the Scottish emblem of good luck. Her trousseau is all British, England and Scotland supplying the gowns and shoes, Ireland the linen and Wales the corsets, etc. The wedding presents were numerous and costly. Care had been taken, however, to prevent duplication and the newly-married couple will not have to worry themselves over what to do with, say nineteen pianos, as King George and Queen Mary had to twenty years ago. The king's gift to the bride was a magnificent set of diamonds and the young princesses clubbed together for a diamond crown.

Fire Destroys Big Automobile.

The big Auburn touring car owned by Walter Broyles, a well known rancher living about three miles north of the city, was destroyed by fire yesterday forenoon on the Medical Springs road seven or eight miles from Baker. Just how the machine

caught fire is not known, but probably resulted from a leaky gasoline pipe. The rear portion of the car was almost entirely destroyed, but the engine was not badly damaged. The machine was hauled from the highway with the assistance of W. J. Miles and O. C. Turner, who were passing by shortly after the accident. It is understood that the car was insured for nearly its full value.—Baker Democrat.
