WOMEN MUST BE SWORN IN

REGISTRATION LAWS PREVENT REGISTRATIONS

Detail List of Measures to Be Voted on at Special Election.

Women voters, who want to vote at the special referendum election, will be required to swear in on November 4 in this county. The 1912 registration precincts and registrations prevail by necessity of various causes, and women can be sworn in by the usual method, but they cannot register. The complex situation arising from the changes of precincts in this county required by the 1913 law, muddles matters all around, and though women are allowed to register in some counties County Clerk Ed Wright is following the advice of state officials and will adhere to the 1912 registrations which men and women must be sworn in.

The November election calls for a vote on important measures, the University of Oregon appropriations being among them. The complete titles of the questions as they will appear on the ballot, are:

State university building repair fund—referred by authority of Mr. H. J. Parkinson, as secretary, Oregon Higher Educational Institutions Betterment league, No. 409 Oregonian building, Portland, Oregon—Its purpose is to provide funds for repairs and additions to the state university buildings, as follows: Library building, thirty thousand dollars; engineering building, fifteen thousand dollars; Deady hall, ten thousand dollars; heating plant, ten thousand dollars.

University of Oregon new building appropriation—referred by authority of Mr. H. J. Parkinson, as secretary, Oregon Higher Educational Institutions Betterment league, No. 409 Oregonian building, Portland, Oregon. Its purpose is to provide funds to construct, equip and furnish a modern fire proof administration and classroom building, and to extend the heating plant to the same. The amount appropriated therefor is one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000).

Sterilization act—referred by authority of Mrs. Lora C. Little, as vice president, Anti-Sterilization league No. 7110 43rd avenue, Portland, Oregon. Its purpose is to authorize the state board of health to order such surgical operations as the board shall adjudge, to be performed upon habitual criminals, moral degenerates and sexual perverts, both male and female, and defining who shall be considered as such, the same being persons confined in some state institution.

County attorney act—referred by authority of Mr. J. E. Craib, No. 431 Worcester building, Portland, Oregon. Its purpose is to provide a district attorney for each county in the state and to fix their salaries in lieu of the present system of having a district attorney for several counties, clothed with the authority to appoint deputies for other counties.

Workmen's compensation act—referred by authority of Mr. Wilfred E. Farrell, No. 623 Lumbermens building, Portland, Oregon. The purpose of this measure is to create a state industrial accident commission, composed of three commissioners, to provide a fund for the compensation of

injured workmen employed in hazardous occupations, to be raised partly by the state, partly by employers and partly by employes, the commission to determine the amount under the act to be paid any person or persons on account of any injury received in the course of his employment.

From time to time the Observer will publish the complete text of the bills appended are two:

This is the way the measures will appear on the official ballot:

Entitled, "An act to appropriate money for the purpose of making additional repairs and improvements to the buildings and heating plant of the University of Oregon."

Be it enacted by the people of the state of Oregon:

Section 1. That the sum of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000), in addition to that provided by law be and the same is hereby appropriated out of the general fund in the treasury of the state of Oregon, for the years 1913 and 1914, for the purpose of providing the necessary funds for the use of the University of Oregon for the said years for the following purposes:

For the construction of an addition to the library building, including steel book stacks, thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000).

For repairs, improvements and additions to the men's dormitory building, the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000).

For repairs and addition to the engineering building, the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000).

For repairs and improvements to the building known as Deady hall, the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000).

For extension and repairs to the heating plant, the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000).

Section 2. The moneys hereby appropriated shall be paid only on the warrants drawn by the secretary of state on the state treasurer.

A Measure.

To appropriate money for the purpose of constructing an additional building for the University of Oregon, filed in the office of the secretary of state, February 26, 1913, to be submitted to the legal electors of the state of Oregon for their approval or rejection at the special election to be held November 4, 1913, upon petition for referendum filed in the office of the secretary of state May 29, 1913, in accordance with the provisions of Section 1 of Article IV of the Constitution of the state of Oregon.

An Act.

To appropriate money for the purpose of constructing an additional building for the University of Oregon.

Be it enacted by the people of the state of Oregon:

Section 1. That the sum of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) be and the same is hereby appropriated out of the general fund in the treasury of the state of Oregon, for the years 1913 and 1914, for the purpose of providing the necessary funds for the use of the University of Oregon for the construction, equipment and furnishing of a modern, fire-proof administration and class room building, and the extension of the heating plant to the same.

Section 2. The moneys hereby appropriated shall be paid only on the warrants drawn by the secretary of state on the state treasurer.
