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SULZER IS OUT OF OFFICE BY BIG MAJORITY

GLYNN TAKES OFFICE AT NOON WITH LITTLE CEREMONY OR WORDS.

IMPEACHMENT IS DECISIVE

New York Governor Ousted From Office and His Lieutenant Takes His Place—Situation Is Such That Sulzer Can Run for Governor Next Time—Three Counts Against Him Held.

Albany, Oct. 17.—The impeachment court by a vote of 43 to 12 removed Governor Sulzer from office. The vote to remove him followed his being found not guilty of articles five, six, seven and eight. He is not disqualified from holding office in the future.

Governor Sulzer was removed from the governorship by the impeachment court by a vote of 43 to 12 today. Lieutenant Governor Glynn was sworn in a few minutes before 1 o'clock to succeed him. Glynn evidently considered the time inopportune for an inaugural address and assumed his office practically without comment.

Sulzer too was taciturn. He told one of his attorneys, Samuel Thomas, that he had only begun the fight, and added later that under the circumstances he welcomed the verdict of removal since the filing of the impeachment articles had ruined his usefulness as governor. He issued no formal statement, but he might do so later it is said. He gave the impression that he would be a candidate for governor at the next election on the democratic ticket if that party would have him and if not then he would run independently. He was removed from office after the court had voted not guilty of the following charges embodied in the impeachment articles five, six, seven and eight, that he had persuaded Broker Colwell from responding to the subpoena from the investigating committee; that he had committed larceny in speculating with the campaign funds; that he threatened to use his office and influence for the control of public officials; that he used his official authority corruptly to affect the prices of the stocks because he was personally interested in them. His removal does not disqualify him from holding office in the future.

Governor Glynn later issued a short formal statement in which he said that he felt only sadness in his succession of Sulzer as governor. He pledged himself to an honest, progressive administration.

Parents Met With Teachers.

Baker, Or., Oct. 17.—A teachers-parents meeting was held at the So. Baker school by County Superintendent Strange yesterday afternoon, there being about 25 mothers of school children present to meet with the teachers and superintendent. Matters of mutual interest were discussed, with the idea of co-operation and several of the mothers present expressed themselves as greatly pleased with the plan of Prof. Strange to work with the parents for the good of the children. The teachers, too, expressed their views and the superintendent made quite a lengthy address, in which the public playgrounds question played an important part. This was the second of a series of weekly meetings of the teachers and parents that will be held through the year at the various grade buildings.

Mrs. Dora Miller Dead.

Baker, Or., Oct. 17.—At North Powder yesterday morning at 9 o'clock, Mrs. Dora Miller passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. W. E. Hill, at the age of 58 years.

Mrs. Miller for several years conducted Miller's restaurant on First street in this city and her illness dates from the fire that occurred in the restaurant on the 17th of last June, the excitement causing her complete breakdown.

The deceased is survived by six children, three sons and three daughters, all grown.

Funeral services will be held at the chapel of Welch & Company, next Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Perjury Case Now At Trial

ROMANCE SPARKLES THROUGHOUT PERJURY CASE.

FIRST JURY WRONG

Ray Clark of Union on Trial in Workman-Houghton Romance in 1911.

Ray Clark of Union is today on trial for perjury which the state alleges was committed December 26, 1911, when he, it is alleged, swore that Miss Vera Houghton of Wallawa county, was of age, when she was not, and that she was a resident of Union county when, it is asserted, Wallawa county was her home. After nearly two years, the trial was called this morning, but after the various indictments and reindictments that have come, came a slipup this morning and after a jury had been selected to try him it developed that the record was not clear as to what Clark had pleaded to the last indictment. The jury was discharged and a new jury picked after Clark had been required to plead again. This time he pleaded not guilty and the case progressed.

Romance is attached to the case in many angles, though Mr. Clark did not particularly figure in it except that he signed the marriage license, which set forth that bride was of age.

Romance Began at Wallawa.

The case is the outcome of a romance which started at Wallawa late in December of 1911. Miss Vera Houghton and Jacob Workman, both of Wallawa came to La Grande one afternoon to be married; the bride-to-be was not marrying with the sanction of her mother it seemed, and Mrs. Houghton telephoned from Wallawa to the authorities before the train arrived, to hold the couple here until the mother could come to La Grande. This was done and cupid was blocked momentarily. The local police held the couple for two days but Mrs. Houghton did not arrive to take charge and the couple were given their liberty. To get a marriage license and be married by C. J. Black, were their next moves, and Ray Clark was the witness to the marriage certificate. The same evening that the couple had been married, Mrs. Houghton called County Clerk Wright by telephone asking that he stay the marriage. The certificate had been issued regularly so far as he knew, however, and he had no authority to prevent the marriage. On her request, however, he consulted with the authorities here that evening, but in the meantime Mrs. Houghton had ordered the arrest of Workman through Wallawa county officials on a charge of abduction of her daughter. This charge was eventually allowed to pass by but Mrs. Houghton came to La Grande the following day and looked into details of the matters. The upshot was that Clark was indicted for signing the certificate, and he has been in court and out of court several times since.

Mr. and Mrs. Workman made their home in La Grande indefinitely after their marriage and are witnesses in the case today.

Welsh to Fight Steve Ketchel Tonight

Denver, Oct. 17.—Freddie Welsh, the lightweight champion of England, and Steve Ketchel will box ten rounds at the Colorado Athletic club arena here tonight. Welsh recently jumped into the limelight by going through the motions of winning the lightweight championship from Ritchie, when the latter hedged out of a fight engagement with the clever little Englishman. Welsh claims the title by the forfeit route and now refers to Willie Ritchie as "former" lightweight champion of the world. Welsh expects little trouble with Ketchel.

Dead at the Age of 88 Years.

Baker, Oct. 17.—After only a brief illness from a stroke of paralysis and heart trouble, Mrs. Sarah J. Golden died at 10:30 Wednesday night at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Francis Weitz, 1931 Clifford street, this city. "Grandma" Golden was born in Franklin county, West Virginia, in 1825. She accompanied her parents, Samuel and Rebecca Ulman, to Missouri when she was 15 years of age, and was married at the age of 18 years. Five children survive her as follows: Mrs. Ella Ewell, Bogard, Mo.; Mrs. Loretta Glass, Green Ridge, Mo.; W. M. Golden, South McAllister, Okla.; Mrs. Frances Weitz, Baker, and Thomas Golden, Oklahoma.

GERMAN DIRIGIBLE BURNS UP WHILE LOADED WITH 29 PROMINENT ARMY OFFICIALS

When 3600 Feet In Air, Explosion Occurs—Burned To Crisp When Ground Was Reached

Berlin, Oct. 17.—Zeppelin's dirigible "L 2" exploded and burned today when 3000 feet above the Johannisthal fields. Out of 29 passengers aboard, 28 were killed in the explosion. The airship had been newly built for the German navy and the trip was its first test. Besides the crew, aboard were members of the admiralty commissioners headed by Admiral Behnisch, who was killed. The flight was watched by thousands. Suddenly a heavy detonation was heard and immediately the huge gasbag was swept by flames from end to end. It dropped to earth like a plummet, streaming fire. Only the twisted aluminum framework remained when it struck the earth and this was so hot that it was sometime before anyone could approach it. Troops hurried to the scene to control the crowd and take care of the charred corpses.

The object of this system is to obtain an election upon a majority vote, so that while the one and three year terms have but two candidates for each office, one ballot only is required to obtain that majority. But for the office of two year commissioner we have four candidates, so that each voter can cast one vote for one as his first choice, one vote for one for his second choice and one vote for one for his third choice—but not two

Insane Greek Sees Devils

SHOOTS FELLOW COUNTRYMAN ON IMAGINARY CHARGE.

MURDERER IN JAIL

Baker County Has Another Murder—Victim Attracted Devils.

Baker, Or., Oct. 17.—The Greek who killed Kanelos, was captured at Norton, a little town some six miles from Baker. He made no denial of the murder and stated as his reason that Kanelos brought devils into the camp. Officers believe that the man is insane.

Baker, Or., Oct. 18.—George Kanelos, a Greek, was shot and killed by Anthanasios Chokas, a countryman, at Quartz early this morning, the murderer making his escape.

Chokas, employed on an extra gang by the O. W. R. & N. company, had been threatening to kill several of them during the last three days. The man appeared to be crazy. Arousing from his bunk about 1:30 o'clock this morning, Chokas went to Kanelos' bunk and placed a .22 calibre pistol against his head and fired. Kanelos lived for several hours after the shooting.

The pistol report awakened only one of the Greeks in the bunk, who arose to see what the trouble was. Chokas threatened to shoot him, and the Greek made not attempt to apprehend the slayer.

As Chokas left the tent wherein the men were sleeping, he called, "I'm going to kill all of you." That was the last seen of him, but it was discovered he went to another tent, took a suit case belonging to another member of the gang, but after carrying it for a short ways dropped it. Kanelos was about 45 years old and is reported to have a family living in Portland. Funeral arrangements have not been made.

Court Hears Arguments.

Salem, Or., Oct. 17.—Arguments have been made before the supreme court in the workingmen's compensation referendum suit. The proceeding was brought by the state, on relation of District Attorney Gale S. Hill against Ben W. Olcott, as secretary of state, to enjoin him from placing the measure on the referendum ballot on the ground that the referendum petition was fraudulent.

Attorney E. R. Ringo argued in behalf of the state and Attorney General Crawford and Attorney Sargent of Portland argued for the defense.

Well Aimed Prayer Book.

New York, Oct. 16.—The ritual murder trial at Kiev, Russia, was condemned in a resolution adopted yesterday by the house of deputies of the joint clerical and lay body of the Protestant Episcopal church at the triennial general convention. The Episcopalians also took steps to amend the prayer-book by amending the passage in the Good Friday collect where Jews are classed with the "infidels, Turks and heretics."

Vatican Sensus Taken.

Rome, Oct. 17.—The Vatican today announced the result of the first census which has been taken within the walls in fifty years. Italy's alw guaranteeing the liberty of the pope prohibits the entrance within the Vatican of any official of the Italian government for the performance of any duty whatsoever. As a consequence, a census taken couldn't get into the sacred walls. The Vatican announces it has within its walls just 420 people. These include the Swiss guards and gendarmes, the employees generally, the household of the pope and Pope Pius himself.

Humphries Backs Up.

Seattle, Oct. 17.—Judge Humphries has dissolved the injunction against street speaking. This step concludes the injunctions and contempt proceedings indulged in by the judge. Last week he released 39 women who were jailed for contempt.

WILSON ENDS PEACE EFFORT WITH HUERTA

OBTAINING OF PEACE THROUGH OTHER CHANNELS IS NOW PEACE POLICY.

TWO AMERICANS SLAIN

Officials of the Dictatorship Resign and Rumors of Huerta's Resignation Persistent—Rebel Leader Has Plan Afoot to Take Temporary Government—Yankees Killed.

Washington, Oct. 17.—Hope of an early solution of the tangle with Mexico has been abandoned by government officials. The president, it is reported, is determined no longer to deal with the Huerta administration but that further steps toward bringing peace with Mexico are being considered. The rift came when it was reported that General Carranza, the rebel leader was negotiating with Huerta to secure peace and included in his proposition that Pedro Lascurian be named provisional president and also the restoration of congress and the holding of an early election.

Unrest at Mexico City.

Mexico City, Oct. 17.—Unrest prevailed in Mexico today as the result of the continued resignations of the Huerta officials. No word had been forthcoming from Huerta regarding his intended resignation and the turning of affairs over to Pedro Lascurian, who was minister of foreign affairs in Madero's cabinet.

Congress Hears War Echoes.

Washington, Oct. 17.—Congressman Sherwood of Ohio, in addressing the house strongly urged a joint action among the United States powers to restore peace in Mexico. He denounced Huerta and suggested an armed protectorate.

SURGERY PHOTO PLANNED.

"Step by Step" Photography Shown to Local Physicians.

H. P. McKusick of Los Angeles, Cal., is in the city endeavoring to enlist the interest of local physicians in one of the most recent developments in the medical science. The science is called Stereo-Clynic and consists in the taking of a number of step by step views of an operation upon the human body. While the science of photographing various operations heretofore has not been new to the profession, the excellence of the performance has left much to be desired. The views represent consecutive steps in the performance of an operation and are placed in such order that the physician who has an operation of the kind to perform can refer to the photographs at any time to see how the world's most famous men in the science of surgery went about the task.

The list of doctors whose work has been made a matter of permanent record in this way includes those of the famous Mayo Brothers, of Rochester, Mich., Dr. Murphy of Chicago, Howard Kelly of Baltimore, Robert Jones of Liverpool, England and a host of men whose names are as familiar to the profession as is the name of Elliott to that of the world of education.

Drs. Holt, Hall and Richardson of this city, have purchased a number of the photographic sets, pertaining to a special line of surgery work. Mr. McKusick also stated that a machine has now been perfected that will photograph the eye with absolute accuracy. Heretofore photographs of the eye have not been able to record the inner make-up of the eye. This new machine has accomplished this feat and the profession has taken eagerly to the new scheme.
