MANY SHEEP SNOW BOUND

RESCUERS CAN'T EVEN REACH TOLL GATE

Wenaha Forest Has Trouble With Snow—Many Bands Caught.

Walla Walla, Oct. 17.—Sheep growers of this vicinity, are much worried over reports from Toll Gate, and other places that the snow is three feet deep and they fear heavy losses, as attempts to get the sheep out of the reserve have failed. There is little or no feed in the mountains for the big flocks of sheep.

One man made an attempt to reach Toll Gate this week and was unable to get within six miles of the place, he reported. The snow was over three feet deep in most places and still falling. Whenever it rains in Walla Walla it apparently snows in the mountains.

Ordinarily the owners are able to get their sheep off the summer range in the reserve upon the end of the grazing season, October 10.

This year the snow commenced falling much earlier than usual and in some places extends nearly to the foothills.

The Walla Walla sheepmen are not alone in danger of losing their flocks. Similar reports have been received from Baker City, Elgin, Pomeroy and other places where sheep are fed in the Blue mountains.

From all these places come reports that unless the weather modifies so that the snow will thaw, the bands of sheep will perish. The snow is so deep as to render travel on horseback almost impossible.

While owners will not put their losses in the form of dollars, it is known that local men stand to lose thousands of dollars if they cannot get their flocks to lower ground.

OREGON HAS KEEN JUDGES

FOREIGN INTERESTS DECIDE OREGON HAS BEST JUDGES.

Favors Oregon Man Chief Judge for Show at Vernon, B. C.

Portland, Ore., Oct. 17, (Special)—Recognition of Oregon as the home of the best experts in the apple industry, is the decision of foreign interests to appoint A. P. Bateman, President of the Oregon State Horticultural Society and Vice-President of the Northwestern Fruit Exchange, as chief judge.

The appointment of Mr. Bateman as chief of the judging staff has been made by the directors of the Okanagan apple show which will be held at Vernon, B. C. October 21st. The appointment has been accepted.

According to word coming from Vernon the apple show this year will be international in character and his services as judge have been in demand for many centers. Only a short time ago an effort was made by a leading apple section of California to secure his aid in establishing a good pack for the apples of that section in an effort to compete with the better appearing fruit of the northwest.

Prices Fall Rapidly, Due It Is Admitted to New Sugar Tariff.

Sugar went down 15 cents a sack, all grades, a day or two ago, and makes a total of 30 cents a sack that the sweetmeat has fallen during a fortnight. Just where the drop will end, no local dealers can even guess at, and the depressions, ordered by big sugar centers, is probably a consequence of the new tariff, sugar being one of the chief items of dispute in the schedule.
