REGISTRATION LAW OUTLINED

WOMEN CAN REGISTER BUT NOT FOR NOVEMBER 4.

Nineteen Twelve Election Registration Rules With Men and Women

Some misunderstanding has developed as to the facts regarding registration of women for the special state referendum election on November 4. As announced in the Observer yesterday, neither men nor women can register now for this special election, and must be sworn in if not registered in 1912, but there is no provision against their registering at this time for further use. The registrations that now take place, both by women and men, are for future elections and will be done according to the new precincts in this county. However, the fact remains that all persons not registered on the 1912 registration books must be sworn in for that particular election but can register now for any election that may follow other than the November fourth election. This necessarily includes all women voters as suffrage was not extended to women prior to the time the 1912 registration closed.

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The registration books which deal with the state elections for the future have been open for some time but close on Saturday night to remain closed until Nov. 5th, at which time women and men can register again as now. To make clear the distinction between the referendum election November 4 and other elections, it might be stated that there was a special act passed by the legislature providing for the referendum election next month, and after setting out the purposes of the act, says:

"Legal electors may vote at this particular election, under their registration for 1912, or upon affidavit of six freeholders as provided by law."

CALL ISSUED TO FARMERS

CONVENTION DECEMBER 2 IS CALLED FOR.

President Swift Sends Out Notices to All Union Members.

The official call for the state Farmers' convention in La Grande, December 2, has been issued by the president, A. V. Swift, of Baker. The call says:

By virtue of authority given me from the State Constitution, Article III, Section 5, page 8, I hereby call the fourth session of the state convention of the Oregon-Southern Idaho Farmers' union to convene in La Grande, Oregon, December 2, 1913, at 10 a. m.

Each local is entitled to one delegate for each 100 members or fraction thereof, and one more delegate for each additional 1000 members or major fraction thereof.

Delegates should be elected at your next meeting and their names sent at once to the state secretary, so that committees can be named and published before the convention. This is done in order to give committeemen time to study up on their subjects and be more ready to act when the convention convenes. Please do not delay the matter of either electing Delegates or sending their names to the state secretary.

Elect an Alternate delegate to serve in case the first elected can not attend.

Our national president, C. S. Barrett, will be with us, and perhaps have a lecture with him.

Make preparations to reach La Grande the evening of December 1.

Steamer In Trouble.

Eureka, Cal., Oct. 17.—The hope of saving the steamer Merced, which went ashore on Point Forda, has practically been abandoned. The loss is estimated at being near \$200,000.

Textbook Prices Are Cut.

Salem, Ore., Oct. 16.—Advices were received today by State Superintendent of Public Instruction Churchill from the Silver Burdett Company that in pursuance to his request, the price of two high school textbooks being sold in the state by the company had been reduced to the same price as they are retailed in Louisiana. Under its contract with the state the company agrees to sell the books as

cheap in this state as in any other state, and finding its price here higher than at which it retailed the books for in the southern state, the superintendent wrote the company.

The two books are Caesar, which has been reduced from \$1.25 to \$1.12, and Cicero's Orations, which has been reduced from \$1.25 to \$1.15. The superintendent has also notified Allen & Bacon Company, of Chicago, that it must reduce the price on cer-

tain books that they are selling in this state. This company contends that it is selling to a general agent and not retailing directly, but the superintendent has reminded the company of its contract, and insists that it must be complied with.

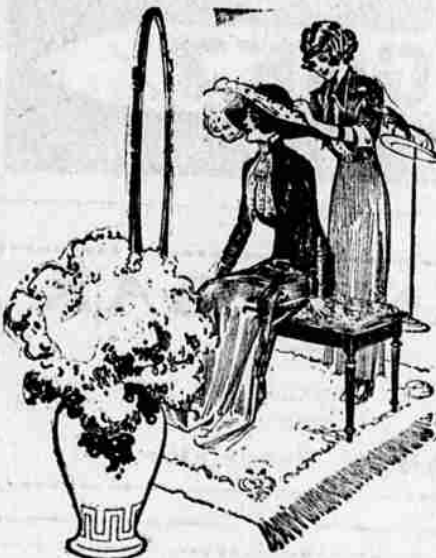
