LUNATICS AT LIBERTY. Sanity Specialist Claims Many Insane Are Not in Asylums. Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 17.—Many lunatics are doing a regular day's work, in the outside world. They are neither known as insane nor do they think themselves lunatics. On the other hand, they have never even questioned their own sanity. This, in ef-

fect, was the statement made today by Dr. Daniel Phelan, of Kingston, Ontario, secretary of the Physicians' Association of the American Prison association, and a leading figure in the annual convention of that organization, which today stands adjourned.

"The human mind is a complex machine," said Dr. Phelan, "and it consists of such a multitude of parts that all of them could not be equally perfect and normally adjusted. There are, in the outside world, people who are attending their various vocations and passing along through life unmarked and unnoticed by the public; and yet some of these people are not sane. They manage to discharge their duties in their respective spheres of life to the satisfaction of all concerned. They succeed in fulfilling their obligations as citizens of the country and still they are really insane. Indeed, many dangerous lunatics and insane persons exhibit a degree of mental vigor and activity many times not present among the sanest and most normal of men or women.

"So long, however, as man's conduct does not endanger human life, or cause him to be a menace to society or a nuisance; so long as a man moves along through the world in the same groove as his fellow-men, he must be considered sane and responsible. He may go to his grave without leaving behind him any more than the faintest glimmer of his true condition.

"Winslow, the great authority, it will be recalled, said in this connection: 'A perfectly healthy mind with perfectly healthy, well regulated passions, has never been known or heard of; the understanding is defective in one way or another, one or another faculty is defective, and the passions likewise are either too strong or too weak in each individual or class of individuals; in everyone there is a mixture of good and evil.' Now the researches of modern investigations have not so far definitely proved whether crime is the result of mental derangement or not. The tendency toward crime, if such a predisposition exists, is an inherent quality of certain persons and depends upon their organic constitution. It is, therefore, necessary that we encourage and develop the power of right thinking, by which a definite aim in life may be attained. Goethe has well said that, 'given the circumstances, any man may be capable of committing any crime.'

Grade Crossings to Go. Salem, Ore., Oct. 16.—That all unnecessary grade crossings in the state will soon be abolished was the announcement made by State Railroad Commissioner Miller, who has made a study of railroad crossings. Calling attention to a letter received from D. W. Campbell, general superintendent of the Southern Pacific company, in which he promised that the company he represented would do everything in its power to eliminate dangerous crossings, Mr. Miller said other railways were co-operating with the commission along the same line and that county courts in most counties had promised to support the movement.

"It is not practicable to eliminate all grade crossings," said Mr. Miller, "but it is possible to eliminate many dangerous grade crossings. That can be done by making all county roads cross the railway tracks at right angles."
