

FIRST GAME IS INDICATOR

DOUBLE FULLBACK SYSTEM TO BE TRIED OUT TODAY.

Various New Styles of Play to Get Test—Players on Workout.

In Union this afternoon the La Grande high school squad is battling with Union. True, the outcome of the game is of much interest but beyond that lies the performance that the team as individuals will put up and upon this showing depends the definite guess for the prospects of the team. The showing before the game is indicative of the season's strength, but not so much as is the first actual game, when stress under fire is demanded.

The average weight of the entire squad, which will be largely tested out by Coach Reynolds this afternoon, is 140 pounds with an average age of 17 years. Hunter and Rosenbaum will alternate at calling the signals.

Dobbin and McMillan are officials of the game today.

The team introduces the double full back system, which is to be given a thorough tryout here. Not only is the double fullback system in vogue along the precise plans that O. A. C. is using them this year with marked success, but the guards in interference system is to be tried out as well. Few coaches can get the guards to do any good in the interference but the youngsters this year seem to have seized the principle of the thing and may catch on with effectiveness. Guards in interference is always the height of perfection if the school is supplied with guards equal to the occasion.

The direct pass from center to back field will be an innovation at Union, too, for although tried in trick plays here before it has never been the practice in the past to eliminate the back position entirely. If these new systems of play and style of play work well today, they may become permanent styles, and the snap with which the local squad handles itself today will largely determine the future of the style, which only a few of even the best universities of the northwest are using with effect. Baker Team Defeated.

Baker, Or., Oct. 17.—Fighting every inch of the way, outplaying their opponents more than half the time, the superior weight and experience of the Weiser high school team, mingled with the "breaks" in the game in the visitors' favor, was too hard a combination for the light, inexperienced Baker high football team to cope with yesterday, and while a comparison of the two teams indicates that Weiser should have won at least 30 to 0, they crossed the Baker goal line but once and the home guards escaped a hut-out through a pretty drop kick from the 35-yard line by Swan in the second quarter, the final score being 7 to 3 in favor of Weiser.

While defeated, the Baker team has every reason to feel proud of the game they played. Outweighed nearly 20 pounds to the man, racing a team of experienced old players, the odds were all in favor of Weiser, more so because Hoff, the fastest half-back and one of the best defensive players of the Baker team, was kept out of the game by reason of the action of the faculty, Hoff being declared ineligible because he has not attended school regularly. There is much feeling in the matter as many are of the opinion that with Hoff in the game Baker would have won, but it is not a matter for newspaper comment.

Canned Goods in Demand.

Eugene, Ore., Oct. 16.—An order for three carloads of string beans for shipment to Chicago, which is declared to be the first large order ever received for shipment of canned vegetables from the west to the east, was received yesterday by J. C. Holt, manager of the Eugene Fruitgrowers Association here.

When the cannery began putting away the Lane county product, there were many who doubted the ability of the association to sell any large quantity.

The Eugene cannery in the past week has dispatched four carloads of dried prunes for shipment to London and two more carloads will go before the end of the week. Prunes have all been dried now and the cannery is busy packing the product.

Apples and pumpkins are coming in from the farmers, the former for the most part to be repacked and shipped green, and the latter to be canned for pies.
