CLARK FREED IN MIDTRIAL

COURT ORDERS VERDICT FOR DEFENDANT.

Admissions of Mrs. Workman Abruptly Ends Clark Trial Friday.

Late yesterday afternoon, the Clark perjury case that apparently would never down, got its solar plexus blow from Judge Knowles when he directed a jury in the circuit court to find Clark not guilty. From the very start of the trial the legal skirmishing was brisk and frequent, but as witness after witness for the state got on the stand and readily acknowledged that in December, 1911, when the affidavit which secured the license by which Vera Houghton, the 15 year old girl was married to Jacob Roll Workman, lived in Wallowa county and was a resident there, Mr. Clark's attorneys seemed to subside

until the state closed. Then the defense was on hand with the usual motions for directed verdict. Many reasons were claimed for allowing it, but the principal one and the one which cleared Clark of the charge, was that the county clerk of Union county had absolutely no jurisdiction or authority to issue a marriage license for a female except to a resident of Union county, and the state's testimony showing the girl wife to have been a resident of Wallowa county, the affidavit was not made before any officer or tribunal having a

Clerk Not at Fault. To protect himself with strangers whom he does not know personally, County Clerk Wright requires invariably that the witness make affidavit that the bride lives in the county in which the marriage is sought, and did so in this case. However, although Clark swore she lived here, she apparently had not, but the affidavit by Clark left no discretion on the county clerk's part but to issue the license. On the other hand courts held that Clark was not prejudicing himself in swearing to that particular clause of the affidavit—it is not required by law, as is the oath to the age question, and therefore is not a matter of perjury.

Both parents testified for the prosecution that their daughter was 15 years and eight months of age at the time of the occurrence. She denied telling Clark, when introduced to him by Workman before the marriage, that she was 18 years and 8 months, but admitted that the witnesses by whom the defense indicated it expected to prove she did so state were present, as claimed, and also admitted telling Bishop Black, before the ceremony, that she was over 18 years of age. By the sudden termination of the trial what is said to have been an elaborate defense was never used.

Kivette Case Up Today. Shortly after noon today the jury in the Kivette case retired for deliberations after hearing the evidence in the case wherein Ed Kivette of this city is charged jointly with Tom Mylin of assaulting Mr. and Mrs. Syd Makin of Cove. Judge Knowles ordered the case to open this morning at 8 o'clock and by noon it was ready for the jury. Kivette is charged with having assaulted the Makin family when he and a group of young people in a machine met the Makin vehicle on the country road, and frightened the horse so that it ran away. That various other assaults were made on the family in the buggy was alleged by the state.
