TWO PIONEERS CROSS DIVIDE

NORTH POWDER MAN WHO BUILT FIRST HOUSE DIES.

New School Grade Is Installed in City Hall on Account of Crowded Conditions.

North Powder, Or., Oct. 17.—(Special)—David McCurry, one of the early settlers of Oregon, died at his home here Sunday night, after an illness of several weeks. Had he lived another month he would have been 73 years old.

Deceased, was born in Dublin, Ireland, and came to this county with his

sister when 15 years old. At the age of 24 he came to the Grande Ronde valley, being one of the party who blazed the trail from The Dalles. For a number of years he and a partner named Bennington, operated a pack train from that seaport into the valley when La Grande consisted of a few log cabins. He built the first house in Union county and in 1862 he married a lady from the Grande Ronde valley. For eight or nine years he lived in Union on what is now known as the Dobbin ranch, which he "broke out" and improved.

David McCurry was a man of kindly disposition and will be missed by friends and neighbors, among whom he has lived for years. He is survived by a wife and son, C. D. McCurry, and a step daughter, Mrs. David Wiggins, all of whom live here.

Funeral services were held in the Methodist church Tuesday afternoon, Rev. Young conducting the services.

Interment was made in the cemetery at this place.

Mrs. Doratha Miller died at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. W. E. Hill, Thursday, October 16th. The deceased was 59 years of age and came to Oregon from Kansas 18 years ago, and has been a resident of this place and Baker county since that time. She leaves a wide circle of friends and acquaintances in both Union and Baker counties. She is survived by her husband, Henry Miller of Bandon, Ore., and six children: Mrs. W. E. Hill, Mrs. Mary Christman, Mrs. Amella Strub and Henry, Jr., Carl and Amelia Miller, all of whom live in Baker county. Funeral services will be held at Welch's undertaking parlors in Baker Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock.
