

ENGINEERING CHIEF IN CITY

G. W. BOSHKE INSPECTS LOCAL VIADUCT PROJECT.

Will Not Venture Guess as to Date of Completion—Water Troubles.

To personally inspect and direct the early portion of the Second street viaduct project, Chief Engineer G. W. Boshke, of the O. W., was in La Grande a few hours this morning from Portland. One of the problems before the engineering department at present is the handling of some eight or nine feet of water in the excavations already done by the railroad company. Pumps have been put on the ground to care for this surplus water and will be connected up just as fast as possible. Mr. Boshke would not venture a guess as to when the project would be finished, but the company intends to exert every energy on the work. The Warren Construction company crews are rapidly excavating the approach from the south for the city, and as yet has had little trouble with water. A goodly portion of the excavation has been finished too. The water problem confronts, principally, the portion of excavation on the railroad right of way. Mr. Boshke spent only a few hours in the city, going east on No. 10.

NEW X-RAY POWERFUL.

Instantaneous Pictures of Tendons and Shadow Pictures Features.

It is with a great deal of pride that the local Grande Ronde hospital boasts the strongest, most powerful and most up to date X-ray machine in the state. It was just recently installed by Wm. Meyers, of Chicago, and has a number of features that make it far superior to the machine which it displaces. Heretofore the machine would not photograph the tendons, would not make shadow pictures of the heart, the intestines, the lungs, or of any part of the human anatomy. But with the new machine this can be done with a skillfulness that is astounding. Another feature which gives the new apparatus superiority over the old device is the fact that it will take instantaneous pictures, whereas the former machine required an exposure of a minute or more in certain cases. With this device it would be impossible for anyone to secrete metallic articles of any kind, by swallowing as is done when tourists meet the customs officers at New York and other important cities, for the purpose of evading the duty. The new machine represents an investment of \$1,500.

OFFICER SUSPECTS DEALERS.

Boys' and Girls' School Agent Thinks Minors Buy Tobacco Here.

J. G. Kilpack, of Portland, whose business it is to look after delinquent and abandoned children throughout the state, is in the city investigating several cases that need immediate attention. Mr. Kilpack has been coming to La Grande for several years and is in touch with the conditions that surround many of the homes furnishing the industrial home with inmates, and the orphanages with new charges. His experience puts him in the prop-

er position to say things in an intelligent manner concerning the influences that are making homeless and wayward children. In this connection he expressed himself today in this manner: "It has come to my notice that some of the dealers in tobacco in your city are selling smoking articles to minors and young boys. There is a state law against such practices and if the habit does not stop I shall be compelled to prosecute these men. The law does not specifically mention pipes but by a ruling of the courts this smoking article is included in the list of prohibited things."

"The greed of some of the men irrespective of the fact that the articles they are selling to these young people are harmful, is damnable to say the least. It is my experience that many of the truants from school get their start in just this way."

"I am in the city in the interest of the Simpson children of Island City, whose mother is said to be incapable of taking care of them. The case was to come up yesterday but was postponed pending an investigation. We may give the children to their grandmother at Hood River, in which case it will not be necessary to put them in the home. There are a few more cases that need attention, but I would have you put particular emphasis on this matter of selling smoking articles to minors. I am as good as my word in this respect and will prosecute the offenders."
