

MOATS POLICY MUST BE PAID

COURT OF APPEALS REFUSES A REHEARING.

After Long Experience In High Courts
Policy Question Is Settled.

Ida M. Moats will derive the cash value of a big insurance policy held by her husband prior to his death at Salem a year or two ago. After being through the circuit court of this county, state supreme court and the United States district court of appeals Mrs. Moats won out, being allowed the full amount of the policy which amounts to several thousand dollars. The insurance company appealed for a re-hearing before the United States circuit court of appeals at San Francisco after having lost its appeal to that body, but yesterday the San Francisco court refused the re-hearing. The Summerville lady will now be in position to collect the face value of the policy. Cochran & Cochran, formerly of this city, were her attorneys in the case. There is no appeal in this case from the United States court of appeals.

Special Train Carried Her.

Mrs. H. Wade and daughters, Fay and Anna, left for their home in Enterprise this morning. Mrs. Wade and daughter, Anna, came down to accompany Miss Fay home, after a stay of six weeks at the Grande Ronde hospital, where she underwent a serious operation.

Her friends held out little or no hope for her until she showed good strength after the administration of the knife.

North Powder Lady Dies.

Baker, Or., Oct. 23.—Mrs. Vina R. Webb, of North Powder, died in this city yesterday after a short illness. She was the wife of V. A. Webb, of North Powder, and had been in Baker for some time, undergoing medical treatment. She was born in Utah but was a resident of this state for a number of years. The remains were taken last night to North Powder, where the funeral will be held today.

Baisley-Elkhorn Mine "Come Back."

Baker, Or., Oct. 23.—John Thomas of this city, former superintendent of the Highland mine and prominent in mining affairs in this section for a number of years, is in town from the old Baisley-Elkhorn mine, which is now under lease to himself and George Snow. Mr. Thomas is highly elated over the results in the three weeks since he started work at the old property. "We are more than pleased with our results," said Mr. Thomas last evening. "Tuesday we encountered \$40 ore in the drift and have ready for shipping 30 tons of ore running from \$80 to \$90 per ton. We have nine men working at present, and are very optimistic over the outlook."

The output has averaged five to seven tons per day since Messrs. Thomas and Snow took charge of the property and the ore will be hauled out the sampling works of the Oregon-Idaho Investment company in this city. Teams will be put to work hauling tomorrow and the output will be gradually increased as the work progresses. Altogether, the old property gives healthy signs of "coming back" and taking its place as one of the big producers in the district.
