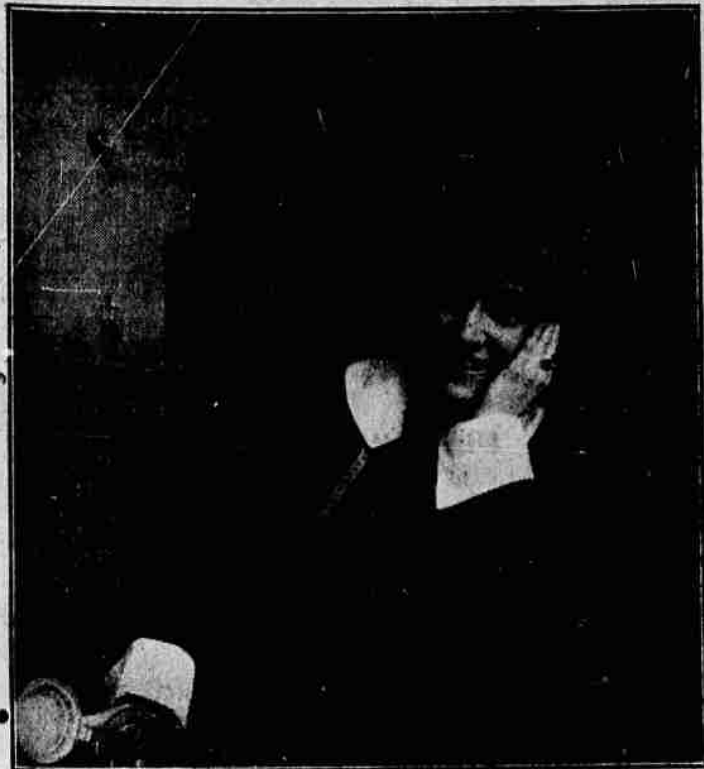


MISS STEADMAN HAS A FUTURE HOG MARKET HOLDING OWN

SOME CENTERS SHOW WEAKNESS AT WEEKEND.

Silverside Salmon Are Scarce—Chinooks Quit Running Now.

Portland, Oct. 24.—The market for hogs was up a nickel for strictly tops yesterday with sales generally at \$8.50. Some of the best offerings went at a lower figure than yesterday.

There was a fair run of hogs but a large per cent of the arrivals came direct to killers. The general situation in the trade may be considered steady. At Chicago there was a weaker tone in the hog trade for the day with the price 5 to 10c under yesterday.

Kansas City hog market ruled weak with a further loss of a dime in the price.

South Omaha hogs showed strength for the first time in a long period. Sales were made at an advance of 10c over yesterday during the morning's trade.

Chickens Remain Quiet.

Very quiet tone remains in the chicken trade. While there is a somewhat more active demand for hens at the lower prices recently quoted, springs are now showing neglect. Whether the price moves up or down within the immediate future depends upon arrivals tomorrow.

Onions Higher on Street.

With available supplies small from local places, owing to the holding tendency among growers, wholesalers on the street have advanced their quotations to \$2 a central. The buying price remains firm at \$1.60 f. o. b. country.

Silverside Salmon Scarce.

The run of salmon in the Columbia has fallen off. Silversides are again rather scarce and the wholesale price here is firm at 6c a pound. No more Chinooks are coming. A better run of Silversides is expected soon.

Florida Grapefruit Lower.

With the arrival of the expected carload of grapefruit from Florida, there has been a sharp lowering of prices along the street. Stocks came

in fine condition and are quoted generally at \$6.25 to \$6.50 a case.

Do You Comply With the BUTTER LAW?

If not, read the following law and have your Butter Wrappers nicely printed, with your name and weight of butter thereon.

CAUTION!

CHAPTER 179, SECTION 3.

"It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association or corporation to sell, offer or expose for sale, any short weight butter within the State of Oregon. All butter sold or exposed or offered for sale in rolls, prints or squares within the State of Oregon, shall be plainly marked: 'Eight ounces, full weight,' sixteen ounces, full weight,' 'twenty-four ounces full weight,' or 'thirty-two ounces, full weight', every roll, print or square sold, offered or exposed for sale shall contain the number of ounces marked thereon; and any person, firm, association or corporation violating any of the provisions of this act, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine or not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$100.00, or by imprisonment in the county jail for not less than six months; or both such fine and imprisonment."
