WALLOWA FRY SHIPPED TODAY

RAINBOW TROUT BEING PLANTED BY STATE.

Bass and Rainbow Make Up Principal Bulk of Wallowa's o.l.t.

The state fish car arrived in La Grande last night laden with a large consignment of young game fish for the Wallowa county streams. There are 125 cans in all; 12 cans of bass and the rest rainbow trout. They will be unloaded at Lostine at different points in the Wallowa river and in Wallowa lake. The car is specially equipped for this service. Parallel with the car are inch pipes through which a constant stream of air is pumped. Small rubber tubes branch off from the main air line and are immersed in the cans. This device keeps the water in constant motion to represent the motion of water in a running stream, and supplies oxygen to the young fish. If the water is not stirred the oxygen in the can is soon consumed and the fish die. The air pumps are kept in motion by a gasoline engine, in charge of Engineer George Cornie. The car is further provided with a cook stove, tables and bunks which enables the men to be in constant attendance.

A little office in one corner of the car, stuffed birds and other wild game in keeping with the purpose of the car, give the whole a very attractive appearance. T. J. Craig, deputy state game warden, is in charge of the car and took great pains to explain the equipment. The fish are from the hatchery at Bonneville, Oregon.

Kinne Family Returns. Mrs. D. C. Kinne, of Hanford, Wash., and Mrs. Dr. E. F. Kinne, of Atwater, Cal., stopped of a number of days to visit at the home of Hugh Kinne, stenographer in the local land office. Hugh Kinne was one of the first men to get to the Panama canal zone in the employ of the government and is conversant with all of the conditions that surround that gigantic piece of engineering work. He has been with the local force for the last three years and is well acquainted in La Grande. His mother and sister-in-law left this morning for their respective homes.

school and before the school was discontinued or abandoned, the Enterprise school district secured deed from the former owners of all their interest in the lands, and, when the county high school was closed, the district demanded the possession of the property and buildings. The county court refused to give possession or to acknowledge ownership in anyone else. The district then brought ejectment, and the case was submitted on an agreed case. Judge Knowles designated Circuit Judge Anderson, of Baker, to sit. Before the case was decided, the county court employed as special counsel to represent the county, W. G. Trill, of Wallowa, A. W. Schaupp, of Joseph, and Cochran & Eberhard, of La Grande. Judge Anderson has now decided that the school district acquired no interest in the property by its deeds, and gives the county judgment. It is understood the case will be appealed to the supreme court.

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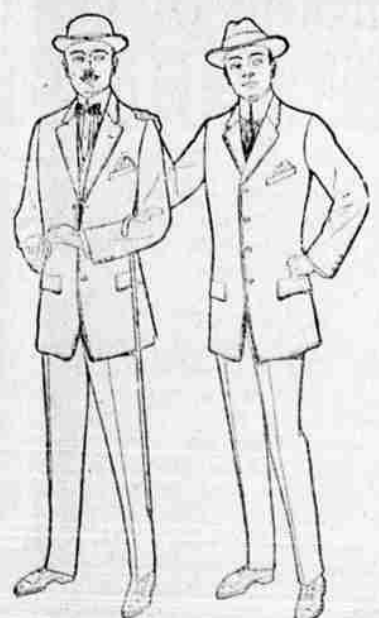
