Later the two fought together with the Greeks in the recent Balkan war against the Turks. Garibaldi has seven opponents for parliament in his district but his name and popularity are expected to sweep away all opposition.

OAKLAND WOMAN AMUCK.

Kills Relations and Attempts Suicide During Jealous Rampage.

Oakland, Nov. 25.—Crazed with jealousy over the alleged attentions paid another woman by her husband, Mrs. Millie Drown fired two shots at her heart yesterday in an unsuccessful attempt at suicide. A few minutes later she shot at her husband, Arthur C. Drown. Two bullets lodged in his head and he died instantly. Twelve hours later she attempted to kill Mrs. Marie Miller, the housekeeper, and Henry Fine, who happened to be in the kitchen of their beautiful home, by placing the revolver against his back. But the weapon did not discharge and she immediately fled. Last night she informed W. H. Drown, a brother of her husband, of the tragedy. She led him to the home where the body was found. She was arrested early this morning. The Drowns lived in a palatial home and are very wealthy.
