MARKETS LOCAL AND STATE

**CORN SHOWS
DRAWING WELL**

PENDLETON SHOWS TO BE WELL PATRONIZED.

Fancy Prizes to Be Given Away to Winners in Annual Corn Show.

The corn crop of Oregon, Washington and Idaho is not only large, but the quality is superior to what was believed would be grown. Yields of as high as 125 bushels per acre of matured corn are assured, and from ten to thirty tons of corn silage to the acre is being cut.

The statement of the O.-W. R. & N. agricultural department that corn would prove a profitable crop, and that it will soon equal the wheat yield of the states of the Pacific northwest is borne out by the crop produced this year.

The plantings are widely scattered, and the area devoted to corn is not known, but during December two corn shows are to be held and some idea as to the acreage will be gained. There will be exhibits of corn from all parts of Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

In addition to the value of the crop, the growers are to receive prizes in cash, farm implements, live stock and works on agricultural and horticultural subjects, valued at over \$2500.

The dates of the show at Colfax for the State of Washington and Idaho are December 2 and 3, and the show at Pendleton will be held on the 5th and 6th days of December.

Every grower of corn who makes an exhibit either at Colfax or Pendleton will be in line for a prize, and he will further emphasize the fact that corn can be grown in the Pacific northwest. Its production means much to every land owner in the states named.

Do You Comply With the
BUTTER LAW?

If not, read the following law and have your Butter Wrappers nicely printed, with your name and weight of butter thereon.

CAUTION!

CHAPTER 179, SECTION 3.

"It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association or corporation to sell, offer or expose for sale, any short weight butter within the State of Oregon. All butter sold or exposed or offered for sale in rolls, prints or squares within the State of Oregon, shall be plainly marked: 'Eight ounces, full weight,' sixteen ounces, full weight,' twenty-four ounces full weight,' or 'thirty-two ounces, full weight,' every roll, print or square sold, offered or exposed for sale shall contain the number of ounces marked thereon; and any person, firm, association or corporation violating any of the provisions of this act, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine or not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$100.00, or by imprisonment in the county jail for not less than six months; or both such fine and imprisonment."
