PENDLETON GAME FRIDAY

LOCALS DRILL STRENUOUSLY FOR BIG CONTEST.

Baker to Come Here the Week Following to Settle Old Scores.

This afternoon the high school squad went through its paces again in a strenuous effort to hew off some of the knots in the games that were made conspicuous at the Wallowa game and in a day or two the team must knock off training again for the Pendleton game. The big games for the Eastern Oregon settlement of honors will come this and next week. La Grande goes to Pendleton on Friday and comes home Saturday to get in shape for the Baker game which is to be played here the week following. This is the heaviest part of the local's schedule, and Coach Reynolds is much elated over the ability of Captain Couch to get back in the game, and the chances are that Winters and Garrity, badly needed men, will be up in studies by Friday to participate in the Pendleton game.

The sudden desire for young blood which struck the major leagues about five years ago drove from the big circuit a lot of men who should be in the majors yet.

When Connie Mack produced a pennant winner by raising some colleges all the others followed his example in so far as securing youngsters is concerned. Mighty few succeeded in getting pennants with kids.

Old Tom Jones was relegated to the minors by Hugh Jennings, and Hughey has not found a man to take his place. In forty games with Milwaukee this season Jones has hit for .348 and has stolen twelve bases, which is pretty fair for an old man.

Cy Morgan, passed up by Connie Mack, is the leading pitcher in the American association. He has won eleven games and lost but two thus far this season. There are several teams which could make good use of Morgan right now, and yet all of them passed him up when Mack got ready to get rid of him.

Captain Young of the University of Pennsylvania football team has made a good record both as an individual

football star and as a team manager. Last year, for instance, in the game with Michigan, in which Pennsylvania defeated the westerners, he performed notably and showed particular aptitude in executing the forward pass.

Captain Young has developed a capable team at the University of Pennsylvania and is confident of winning the big games scheduled for the latter part of the season.

Martin Sheridan, the great all around athlete, will soon get down to training for the indoor season. The hero of many Olympic games is back in the game for good and will do all he can to limber up for the national indoor championships.

Hanens Kolehmalnen, the long distance running star, will now take a rest until the curtain is rung up on the indoor season. The Finn will start in many of the games, and not a few

look to him to shatter some of the long standing records.

The intrusion of Gusbeat Smith into "the game" recalls some of the cognomens boxers used to wear.

Gunboat and Bombardier and Seaman and Petty Officer are tame compared with some past titles.

There was Ike Weir, once a great battler. He was known as the Belfast Spider. Frank Craig, the negro phenom of a decade ago, was rarely called by his right name. He was the Harlem Coffee Cooler to all who had a speaking acquaintance with him.

Frank Herald lugged a peculiar moniker, too—that of the Nicetown Slasher. Jack Dempsey was the Nougarell and George La Blanche the Marine. The Tippen Slasher was Benny Yanger's pet title. Jabber Carey was the handle of a fellow who met all the noted boxers now prominent.

Billy Melody, who whipped Joe Wolfcott and won the welterweight championship, was popularly referred to as Honey. The appellation holds to this day.

Kneekost Brown and One Round Hogan were appropriate and freshish nom de plumes. They were a little different from Young and Kid, which seem to have been and still are the most numerous titles for aspiring youngsters.
