POLIGAMY IS JURY CHARGE

E. S. HARNEY, INDICTED AND ARRAIGNED.

Elgin Man Sent to Penitentiary for Larceny in a Dwelling.

E. S. Harney, a La Grande contractor, has been accused of the crime of polygamy by the grand jury, recently discharged. This was the outcome of a case wherein Harney was arrested at North Powder on a bigamy charge, brought here and charged with low cohabitation and bound over to the grand jury. He has been arraigned.

Ralph Moffitt of Elgin, has been sent to the penitentiary for a term of one to seven years as a result of the grand jury session. He was accused of stealing money from H. W. Beuhl's store at Elgin, where he was employed, and pleaded guilty to the charge and was sentenced. The same grand jury indicted A. Newlin on a statutory charge.

If I were the worst outlaw in the west is one thing a Spaniard will not brook. I wired the Cuban ambassador and the Spanish Ambassador last night and will take up the matter with the governor at Salem. I am a graduate of the Boston Polytechnic Institute and am of the best connections in Havana. George B. McClellan and our people are the most intimate friends and when he hears of the insult there will be something doing.

"I am a 32nd degree Mason and was only through the good offices of a prominent member of the Huntington lodge that we were given our liberty. All of the people of the city were with us and resented the insult. "Money is no object to me and if the incident costs me \$25,000 that will be nothing to the satisfaction I will get in seeing this marshal punished."

Mr. Osiel is a scholar, being master of ten different languages. He spoke fluently in German with a reporter of the Observer and also in his native tongue besides speaking English well. He left this morning for branch line points and will join his companions in Baker. He is on his way east. His father is one of the wealthiest plantation owners in Cuba. It is likely there will be some interesting developments to this incident.

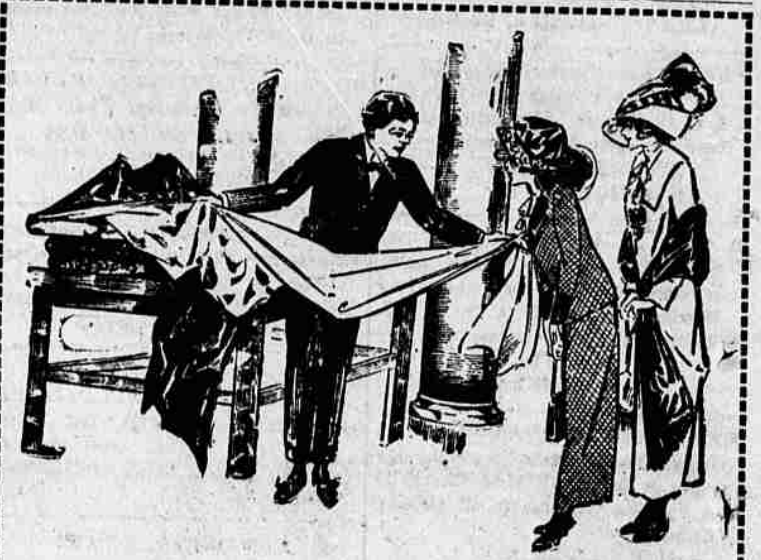
