La Grande Pioneer Here.

J. F. Alden, one of the first residents of La Grande, now located in Portland, was in the city exchanging greetings and looking after his business interests. "When I came to La Grande a good many years ago," said he, "there was but one house in this section of the valley, and that was the one owned by Mr. Ben Garndy an aged and respected citizen of the city at the present time. Where the business section of the city is now located, there was at that time a big oat field. I was 22 years old at the time and there was no railroad. We made the trip on wagons and had all of the difficulties that beset pioneers. Wolves howled at the foot of the hills at night and made one feel that he was greeting a rather dismal reception."

When asked what he thought of La Grande today he made the frank statement that it is the liveliest town in Oregon. "Of course said he Portland is bigger but, all joshing aside La Grande is the busiest town in Oregon. I have seen a good many cities of the west and north west in the past months and I can truthfully say that there is no such activity anywhere in the state. If I can exchange my Portland property for desirable property in La Grande I might move back and spend the remainder of my days among my old friends. The Curries and the Snodgrasses and other settlers of the valley used to chum with me and I like the place."

Mr. Alden left this morning for Elgin, where he expects to purchase cattle. Before going to Portland he owned a fine ranch in the Starkey country and friends of that locality will be pleased to hear a word about him.
