APPLES UP 25 CENTS A BOX

LOCAL PRICES INCREASED DURING PAST FEW DAYS.

Grapes Grow Scarce and Will Soon Be Gone.

Grapes will not be on the local market for many days more. Malagas are about gone and tokays will not last much longer than a week or more. But in the place of these table delicacies fresh California figs in various sized packages and dates from Arabia will take the place of the fruits that will disappear for the season. The quality of grape fruit on the market is the best seen in many a day and is selling at 15 cents straight.

The egg market all along the coast has gone up and the local market is affected accordingly. Packed eggs are quoted at 40 cents.

The tone in the apple market has increased for the better owing to the pressure that has been brought to bear on the price by the Hood River people. The price is up 25 cents a box which will be good news to all farmers and fruit growers of the valley. Foreign exportation has increased heavily during the past week and the local markets are becoming alarmed at the great quantities shipped to foreign countries.

There is little change in the live stock market. Receipts were normal at the Portland yards and at Chicago and Kansas City. Wheat seems on the upward climb. Following are the local quotations:
