Mountain Climbing Dangerous. Basel, Switzerland, Nov. 5.—One hundred and sixty-five Alpine climbers were killed during the season just closed, according to government statistics available today. The killed include fourteen women and four guides. By nationalities the victims were: Austrians, 66; Germans, 49; Swiss, 24; Italians, 7; French, 4; other countries 9. It is estimated that 88 per cent of the fatal accidents could have been avoided if the climbers had taken the proper precaution and observed simple Alpine rules. The principal causes were bad weather, searching for flowers in dangerous places, slipping, and the breaking of snow bridges.

Insurance Race Starts. El Paso, Tex., Nov. 5.—Fifteen cars today are competing in a 531-mile auto race from El Paso to Phoenix, Arizona, over the Borderland route. Four thousand dollars in cash will be divided among the first four cars finishing within the required time limit.
