NEW GROUNDS ARE PERMANENT

HIGH WIRE FENCE TO KEEP THE FANS OFF FIELD.

Baker-La Grande Game Promises to Draw Crowds.

The new athletic grounds decided upon by the members of the high school athletic board are about completed and will be in the best shape possible for the big game with Baker Friday afternoon.

Permanent plans have been adopted and everything has been fixed according to that plan. Nothing but of the first class has been added to the field and nothing is lacking but a new grandstand. The field is so situated that stormy weather will not make the grounds the least bit muddy and so will not hinder the attendance at the games.

The plan used now by so many new athletic fields among the colleges of not having an inclosed field will be tried. Everyone will be tagged, the tag being their ticket and worn so that the guards can readily see who has paid and who has not. Of course it may be impossible to keep all of the small boys out but nevertheless they will have a hard time getting in without the tags. Guards will be stationed at different points of the field until the people get accustomed to the idea of not seeing the athletic games from behind a high board fence.

The field of play will be inclosed by a wire in order to keep the spectators off the field of play. This wire will run just a few feet outside of the side line and nobody but officials and substitutes will be allowed inside the inclosure, ensuring everyone an equal chance to see the games. The idea of everyone moving along the field as the ball advances will be done away with. The line-up for the game with Baker has not been officially announced yet and will not be known until just before the game. Westering will, in all probabilities be in the line-up. Conkey will play the tackle position though.

A few of the men have not fully recovered from the effects of the Pendleton game but will be in shape by the time the whistle blows. Hunter has recovered from the injuries received to his ribs early in the season and will probably be able to play the entire game and will do the signal work. La Grande weighs 140, Baker 152, so the game will be a scrap from start to finish as the locals are out to win back their lost honors.

The high school will be dismissed at 2:45 and will attend the game in a body. The lateness of the starting will necessitate the whistle sounding at 3 o'clock sharp, so get a little red tag on and be on hand to help support the team. Out of town officials will be used.

Do You Comply With the BUTTER LAW?

If not, read the following law and have your Butter Wrappers nicely printed, with your name and weight of butter thereon.

CAUTION!

CHAPTER 179, SECTION 3.

"It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association or corporation to sell, offer or expose for sale, any short weight butter within the State of Oregon. All butter sold or exposed or offered for sale in rolls, prints or squares within the State of Oregon, shall be plainly marked: 'Eight ounces, full weight,' sixteen ounces, full whight,' 'twenty-four ounces full weight,' or 'thirty-two ounces, full weight,' every roll, print or square sold, offered or exposed for sale shall contain the number of ounces marked thereon; and any person, firm, association or corporation violating any of the provisions of this act, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine or not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$100.00, or by imprisonment in the county jail for not less than six months; or both such fine and imprisonment."
