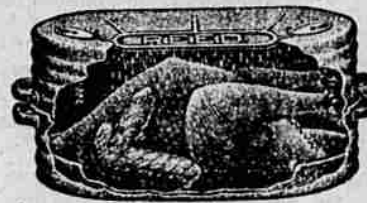

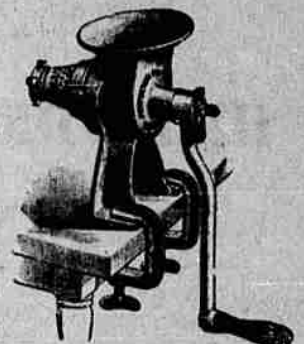

ning gear. Without money the in-
stitution must disappear, and the
honor roll started last night is still
open for help. Slight assistance from
every merchant and business man and

membership support from the rank
and file, are the two absolute needs of
the hour and the club prepared to send
out a committee to call upon business
men not in attendance last evening.
Of some 50 men on hand when, just
before the clock struck 12, every in-
dividual either subscribed or promised
to subscribe something substantial in
the way of a lift toward the debt rais-
ing feature. Several business men
were not on hand and there is every
reason to believe the debt will be wip-
ed out and the club started on a clear
and unharassed footing.

The evening was an exceptionally
pleasant one. President Stange pre-
sided, and the financial affairs of the
institution were discussed pro and
con for some little time. That the
membership must be swelled to a
point where it will make the club
self sustaining, was the agreement
reached after hearing reports from
the secretary and president. How
best to get the membership was dis-
cussed at length, and unsolicited,
many of those present later joined the
club and paid their first monthly fee
of a dollar.

But business was not all. The La
Grande band played numerous selec-
tions, the L. D. S. male quartet sang
some excellent numbers during the
evening, Beaugard & Scott, represent-
ing the proposed conservatory of
music here, presented instrumental
numbers, and a vaudeville team ap-
pearing at the Arcade theatre early
this week, appeared with some high
grade comedy dialogue and singing
before departing on the midnight train
for Spokane.

The meeting was highly enjoyable
from every viewpoint. That the \$1,-
200 debt will be largely wiped off the
slate is apparent. Directors M. K.
Hall, Larry Larrison, L. J. French, E.
E. Kirtley and Secretary Joe William-
son, will attempt to add other sub-
scriptions to the honor roll at once.
That out of the way, permanent up-
keep will come in for consideration.
