Notice of the recorder of the city of La Grande, Oregon, of the assessment of Improvement District No. 81 of the city of La Grande, Oregon.

Notice is hereby given that the assessment for the improvement of the alley in block 106, Chaplin's addition, being Improvement District No. 81, of the city of La Grande, Oregon, under the provisions of Ordinance No. 754, Series 1913. "An ordinance declaring the cost of improving the alley in block 106, Chaplin's addition to the city of La Grande, Oregon, between the north property line of Elm street and the south property line of Depot street, in said city; determining the property benefitted thereby; laying an assessment thereon to defray the costs and expenses of said improvement; providing for an assessment roll of the same, and directing the entry of such assessment roll in the docket of city liens; providing a time when the same shall become delinquent and requiring Chaplin's Addition to the City of
