PROF. LEWIS LEAVES IN SHORT TIME FOR EAST

Paul Crouter Tells of Student Body Activities at O. A. C.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Nov. 7.—Prof. C. I. Lewis, head of the horticultural department, will go east for the greater part of November. On November 12 he will attend the Association of American Agricultural colleges and experiment stations. Later he will attend the American Pomological society at Washington, D. C., and also the Society for Horticultural Science, and the Northern Nut Growers' association. Mr. Lewis will present the subject of "Irrigation as a Factor in Fruit Production" before the horticultural societies.

Prof. Potter gave an interesting talk on "Starting in the Cattle Raising Business" before the agricultural club on Wednesday evening. Mr. Marshall, a Nebraska university graduate, related the advancement of the position of the Aggie student in past few years. Special music for the evening was rendered by Mr. McGinnis.

The men of the green cap have been busy this week hauling wood for the biggest bonfire in the history of O. A. C., which is to be set off next Friday at the final rally before the Oregon game. The two teams are pretty evenly matched for what promises to be the best game of the season. The game will be played on the Albany grid-iron.

Friday afternoon the Rooks and Juniors will battle for the interclass championship with indications pointing strongly to the Freshmen as the probable winners.

The student body held a rousing "Beat Oregon" meeting in the gym Wednesday noon. Songs and yells were practiced and several stirring speeches made by the enthusiastic students.

Henry Odeen was elected president of the Associated Engineers by a narrow margin over A. O. Mangold on Friday afternoon of last week. The other officers elected were Ed Loken, vice president; Pete Rinearson, secre-

tary; R. R. Hammersley, treasurer, and M. C. Hays, sergeant-at-arms.

Prof. R. D. Hetzel is in the east in connection with the extension department work.

Henry Odeen was unanimously elected president of the Rifle association and Sammy Rice, captain. Over 250 men turned out to this meeting.

The U. of O. and O. A. C. glee clubs will exchange concert dates some time after the Thanksgiving holidays.

Local order No. 15 of the "Order of Gregg Artists" was added to the list of college organizations Monday evening. Cedric Clark was elected president of the organization.

Students Express Appreciation

Eugene, Nov. 9.—Spontaneously gathering to celebrate the result of the election in which the people of the state voted to provide \$175,000 for university buildings, the students of the university paraded about the campus and city, finally uniting in a mass meeting in Villard hall. The following resolutions were here passed unanimously, amid cheers and the university yell:

"We, the students of the University of Oregon, in mass meeting assembled, do hereby express our pride in being members of the body politic of Oregon. We call attention to the fact that an understanding of the value and need of higher education rests with no class or caste in Oregon, but is diffused among the entire population, and we believe that in no state is there a firmer foundation than this on which to build for the future.

"We express our admiration for the able and loyal service performed by the press of the state, which was all but a unit in clearly understanding and effectively and truthfully presenting the immensely important issue at stake.

"We regard as leaders whose noble example we shall in our lives strive to follow, those disinterested, energetic, private interests to be served, and no possible personal reward to be gained, gave freely and liberally of their money, their time and their enthusiasm with thought only of the welfare of their state and of posterity.

"We regard as vastly significant for the future of education in Oregon the fact that one of the most energetic leaders of the campaign in behalf of the university is a regent of the Oregon Agricultural college, and as still more significant the fact that the city of Corvallis returned a handsome majority in favor of the university measures. We attribute this in no small degree to the broad-mindedness and

wise patriotism of our fellow students at the Oregon Agricultural college, and as students at the University of Oregon we wish thus publicly to express our appreciation.

"We furthermore take this occasion of pledging to the state of Oregon our renewed loyalty, and of affirming again our determination that in us the people of the state shall find the sacrifices they have made for higher education will redound many fold to the public advantage."

The resolutions then closed with a repetition of the well known "Oregon pledge," by which the student dedicates himself to the welfare of the state.

NOTICE FOR PROPOSED STREET IMPROVEMENT.

To whom it may concern: You are hereby notified that the commissioners appointed by the common council of the city of La Grande, Oregon, to make an examination of the property, upon which assessments are to be levied to pay the costs and expenses of the street improvement hereinafter described, as to the valuation and extent, if any of the benefits to be derived by said property by reason of said improvement, have made their report in writing to said council, which report has been received by said council, and is on file in the office of the recorder of said city, and is open for your inspection. That it is the intention of said council to levy a special assessment against all the property hereinafter described for the purpose of paying the costs and expenses of improving Second street from the north property line of Spring avenue to the south line of the culvert extending over the irrigation ditch or canal crossing said Second street, through lot 3 in block 18 and lot 4 in block 5, Grandy's Addition to said city, by laying thereon Gravel Bitulithic Pavement according to the plans and specifications therefor heretofore adopted by said council and on file in the office of the recorder of said city.

That the real property included in and the boundaries of the district benefited by said proposed improvement are as follows:

Commencing at a point in the center of the alley in block 18 in Grandy's Addition to the city of La Grande, due west of the northwest corner of lot 3 in said block 18, running thence south along the center line of the alley in blocks 18, 17, 16, 15, 14 and 13, in Grandy's Addition to said city to the north property line of Spring avenue, thence east to a point due south of the center of block 10, Grandy's Addition to said city, thence

north along the center line of the alley in blocks 10, 9, 8, 7, 6 and 5, Grandy's Addition to said city, to the south line of the right of way of the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation Company, thence northwest along the south line of said right of way to the north line of lot 4 in block 5, Grandy's Addition to said city, thence west along the north line of said lot 4 and the north line of lot 3 in block 18 of Grandy's Addition to said city to the place of beginning, said Improvement District, consisting of and including the following described parcels of real property, to-wit:

The east half of blocks 13, 14, 15, 16 and 17, and the west half of blocks 10, 9, 8, 7 and 6, in Grandy's Addition to said city, and lots 1, 2 and 3, in block 18, and lots 4, 5 and 6, in block 5 in Grandy's Addition to said city, all in the city of La Grande, Oregon, and the estimated cost of said proposed improvement is \$16,311.60. You will further take notice that said city council will meet at the council chamber in the city building of said city on the 19th day of November, 1913, at 8:00 o'clock p. m. of said day to consider making said proposed levy and will then and there grant a hearing to any and all persons feeling aggrieved against, or on account of, said proposed assessment.

Do You Comply With the BUTTER LAW?

If not, read the following law and have your Butter Wrappers nicely printed, with your name and weight of butter thereon.

CAUTION!

CHAPTER 179, SECTION 3.

"It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association or corporation to sell, offer or expose for sale, any short weight butter within the State of Oregon. All butter sold or exposed or offered for sale in rolls, prints or squares within the State of Oregon, shall be plainly marked: 'Eight ounces, full weight,' sixteen ounces, full weight,' 'twenty-four ounces full weight,' or 'thirty-two ounces, full weight,' every roll, print or square sold, offered or exposed for sale shall contain the number of ounces marked thereon; and any person, firm, association or corporation violating any of the provisions of this act, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine or not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$100.00, or by imprisonment in the county jail for not less than six months; or both such fine and imprisonment."
