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EASTERN SNOW STORM CLAIMS BIG TOLL OF HUMAN LIFE AND PROPERTY

VESSELS DESTROYED AND LOSS OF LIFE REPORTED FROM THE GREAT LAKE TRAFFIC CENTERS

Collision Of Two Steamers Adds To Death List--Light Ship Wrecked And Crew Drowned

Reconstructed Wires Tell Of Enormous Loss Of Property And Big Casualty Lists

Chicago, Nov. 11.—That scores perished in the storm on the Great Lakes between Sunday and today is feared. News of several shipwrecks and reports of others in distress, with numerous missing, are being received today when telegraph communication is restored. It is feared many disasters will be reported on the east shores of the lake toward which distressed craft were driven. Ohio and western Pennsylvania are buried under from two to six feet of snow. Trains have abandoned their schedules and intense suffering from cold is felt. There is a fuel shortage in many of the towns.

Two Ships Collide
Port Huron, Nov. 11.—Returning from the search for wrecks, Captain Smith of the tug Sarnia City reports he believes two steamships were sunk in a collision eight miles north. The names were not learned, but it is believed one vessel is holding the other submerged. It is estimated the uppermost carried a crew of 20. The captain is confident the crews of both were drowned.

The big freighter which sank here is practically identified this afternoon.

NABBED UNDER FEDERAL LAW

HERMISTO NHUNTER VIOLATES NEW ORDERS

Said to Have Shot Wild Birds Before Sunrise Nov. 9th

Pendleton, Nov. 11.—(Special)—The first arrest made in eastern Oregon under the federal game law protecting migratory birds was made early yesterday morning out from Hermiston when E. F. Averill, state and government game warden, surprised Raymond Longhorn, a well known young member of the Hermiston gun club, shooting ducks before sunrise. He was placed under arrest but was allowed to go on his own recognizance pending the action of the government authorities.

The federal law, besides making a closed and open season, provides protection for all migratory birds between sunset and sunrise and that there be no misunderstanding as to the hour of sunrise and sunset, State Warden Finley issued a table showing the hour and minute on different days. On November 9, the hour for sunrise was 7:03. It was 6:30 when the officer discovered Longhorn banging away at the water fowl.

Passenger Line Stalled

Pittsburg, Nov. 11.—Passengers on the liner Huronic are stormbound off Whitefish Point, in Lake Superior. Wireless reports state the vessel is badly damaged and is taking water. Several smaller craft are standing by.

Lightship Wreckage Found

Buffalo, Nov. 11.—Wreckage of the lightship stationed on Lake Erie off Point Abino, Canada, has been found in the harbor here. Captain Williams and a crew of six or eight are believed to have perished. Several small boats were smashed on the rocks in the water front vicinity. Crews of most of them are believed drowned.

SUICIDE WAS WEALTHY

Gun Used in First Attempt and Then Razor Used to Slash Throat

Kamela, Nov. 11.—At 3:30 this afternoon there has been no word from the coroner's jury headed by Justice Williams of La Grande, which went to the Loughlin ranch this morning to hold an inquest over the remains of John Richards, found last evening on the ranch not far from Kamela with signs of suicidal cause of death. The victim's throat was gashed when found, and a razor was found nearby. That Richards was depondent was freely reported. It is further evident from gossip reaching Kamela that he had attempted suicide by another route than the one he died by, if it is suicide. A revolver with the hammer snapped, but no bullet fired, was found in the vicinity on the homestead where the man was cutting wood.

It is said he has a son somewhere in Colorado, and that he is wealthy, but little authentic information has been received.

There seems no room for doubt but that suicide caused death.

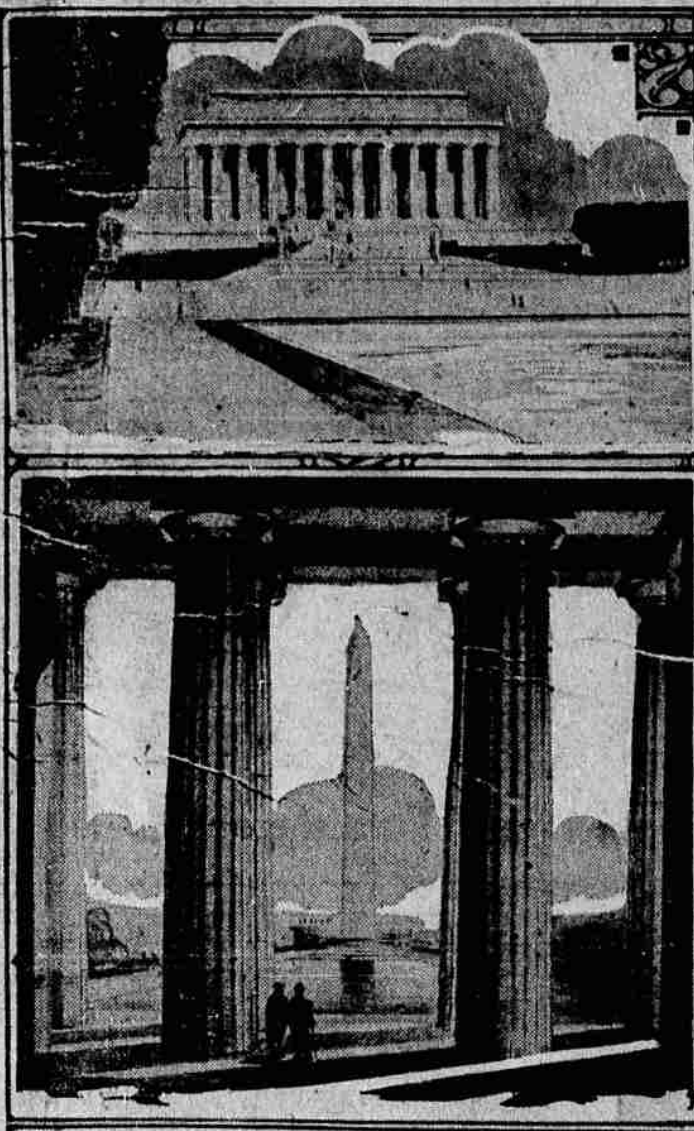
St. Louis to Have Training School for Sunday School Teachers

PENDLETON HOMES QUARANTINED THIS WEEK

SMALLPOX PREVAILS

Fifteen Homes Quarantined For Measles and One For Smallpox

Pendleton, Nov. 11.—(Special)—Still the epidemic of measles continues to spread among the school children, four or five cases having been reported since Saturday. Even the doctors' children are not escaping. Allen, the four-year-old son of City Physician and Mrs. I. U. Temple, and Marian, the little daughter of Dr. G. O. Hoisington, being among the latest to be seized with the illness. None of the cases reported are of a severe form but, nevertheless, are being quarantined.

At present there are about 15 houses quarantined in the city, according to the police. The following are among the number: Hoisington home, 215 Main; Temple home, 224 South Main; Hansen home, 714 Star street; Roesch home, 419 Chestnut; Graybeal home, 501 Lillith; Compton home, 305 Cosble street; King home, 914 West Court; Alta House; Marple home, 1618 West Railroad; Minnis home, 161 West Railroad; Kenneth Terwilliger home, 723 Ann and the Dean Shaw home, 407 West Webb.

One house, the residence of George Mansfield, 613 West Blum, is quarantined for smallpox.

SUPREME COURT REFUSES TO GRANT STAY

WEST STILL SILENT

Oswald Hansel May Now Have to Pay Death Penalty for Murder

Salem, Nov. 11.—The supreme court has refused to grant a stay of proceedings in the case of Oswald Hansel, sentenced to be hanged next Friday for the murder of Judge Frank Taylor of Astoria.

Hansel will be executed next Friday unless Governor West reprieves him.

BATTLESHIP UNDER ORDERS

Fighter Needed at Tuxpam, Where Rebel Troubles Brew

Washington, Nov. 11.—The battleship Louisiana has been ordered to Tuxpam, where an attack by rebels is threatened. Foreign property and lives are believed to be in danger. The gunboat Wheeling is already on its way.

ENGLAND WILL WITHDRAW ITS RECOGNITIONS

CENTRAL AMERICAN AUTHORITIES PROMISE TO AID THE UNITED STATES

MINISTERS PROMISE HELP

Removal of Dictator Thought to Be Nearer Than Ever Before—Conference Last Night Brings Results—Other Diplomats at Mexico City Join in Crusade Against the Dictator

London, Nov. 11.—That England intends to immediately withdraw recognition of Huerta's government is reported in diplomatic circles here this afternoon. The action is taken to follow the note of yesterday when Uncle Sam made it clear he had not and never would recognize the dictator.

Washington Less Worried

Washington, Nov. 11.—Administration circles are more confident than for some time that Dictator Huerta is to retire shortly. No reason is given for the belief, but it is understood that several other foreign diplomats at Mexico City have joined with Charge d' Affaires O'Shaughnessy and Embassy Lind in exerting such pressure and it is thought impossible to resist.

Co-operation of Central American governments with the United States is a policy counted on by Washington officials, following the conference last night with Secretary of State Bryan and Central American ministers. Bryan submitted a complete statement of President Wilson's negotiations with Huerta and told them peace on the entire hemisphere depends upon the solution of the Mexican problem. The ministers are said to have pledged their countries' support.

WHIPPING POST ECHO WRATHFUL

CONGRESSMAN INTRODUCES A BILL TO ENJOIN IT

Delaware Law Will Be Debated in House—Called Inhuman

Washington, Nov. 11.—Representative Evans of Montana has introduced a resolution in the house directing the department of justice to institute injunction proceedings to prevent the whipping post law in Delaware becoming effective. He says the practice is cruel and inhuman.

LAND DECISION APPEALED

Bill of Exceptions Spells Notice of Appeal in Land Grant Cases

Portland, Nov. 11.—A bill of exceptions in the cases of 7000 cross-complaints in the litigation between the government and Southern Pacific over the Oregon-California land grant, was filed in the federal court today as formal notice of appeal to the circuit court of appeals. The decrees forfeiting 2,300,000 acres of this land in Oregon to the government were signed by Judge Wolverton in July.
