

PORTLAND SEES ORDERS DELAYED

COMMISSION TO MAKE MORE EXPLICIT ITS LAWS

Chairman O'Hara Announces Working Order Is Held Up Again

NEW RULING DELAYED

Because no definition has been made by the industrial wage commission of the term "experienced woman worker" the ruling of the industrial wage commission providing that these be paid not less than \$8.64 a week, will not go into effect Monday, as scheduled. The state wide conference will present recommendations this week and after that a ruling will be made fixing the time of apprenticeship. "In the meantime," said Chairman O'Hara, "the ruling will be more directive than binding."—Portland Telegram.

In this official notice issued at Portland yesterday the industrial welfare commission makes announcements that in the above statement are self explanatory.

The petition from local business men and working girls went in to Portland last evening and will be placed before the commission when that body holds its conference this evening to outline its final action.

The petition as it went in carried the names of 156 girls who signed the remonstrance yesterday afternoon following a meeting in the council room. These names are in addition to those of the merchants and business men in general.

BONES BROKEN IN AUTO CRASH

YOUNG MEN ON HORSES SUSTAIN BROKEN BONES

John Thompson and Grover Good Seriously Hurt Last Evening

Grover Good, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Al Good, and John Thompson, 22, son of William Thompson, both of this city, were seriously and painfully hurt last night when horses they were riding were knocked down by an automobile, or shied and fell on the slippery pavement, pinning both riders under their respective mounts. The accident occurred on North Fir street in front of the Snowflake bakery. The boys are today confident that the automobile struck the Thompson mount, knocking the animal down, and it in turn bore the Good mount down to the pavement with it. The accident occurred with such rapidity that it was difficult to determine just what had happened. The fall resulted in the breaking of Mr. Thompson's leg just above the ankle, both bones snapping, and also in breaking one of Mr. Good's feet between the toes and the instep. Ligaments were torn and the bruises are very painful.

The driver of the car was not identified and the injured men say the machine was not stopped by the accident.

HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE.

It Causes Hardening of the Arteries and Other Grave Troubles.

Physicians have always studied the pulse, because it gives valuable information concerning the body's condition of health or disease. But it is only recently that they have begun to use the term "blood pressure" frequently and to regard the amount of that pressure as of great importance. That is because they now have instruments for accurately measuring the pressure, which previously they could only estimate by feeling the pulse.

Blood pressure or the degree of tension of the blood current within the arteries is chiefly significant because a permanent increase in it is quite sure to be followed in time by hardening of the arteries and by the degeneration or disease of important organs, especially the kidneys.

The blood pressure is increased by a number of causes that increase the force of the heart beat or that contract the smaller blood vessels. Any excitement—anger, joy, fear, "nervousness"—raises it temporarily. But that is of little importance unless the emotion is frequently repeated or unless the person already has diseased arteries. The blood pressure that is permanently high is more serious. That comes from long continued mental excitement, such as worry, business anxiety or political strife or from the action of certain poisons that are formed in the system and not properly excreted.

These poisons come from the waste products of digestion, especially in large meat eaters. They raise the blood pressure by causing the smaller arteries to contract.

In small amounts these poisons are excreted at once, but in persons who eat large quantities of meat, especially of beef and mutton—poultry and fish are less harmful—they are sometimes formed in amounts so large that the kidneys cannot dispose of them promptly. When this happens, especially if it occurs in a person who is under a constant mental strain, like the politician, the financier or the chronic worrier, there is grave danger of a permanently high blood pressure and, following that, of hardening of the arteries and of kidney disease, mental disturbance or apoplexy.

If you must worry be a vegetarian: if you must eat meat do so only once a day or better still, every other day. —Youth's Companion.

King of Flowers.

On the score of age alone the peony should command the interest of all flower lovers. It has a history which began many hundreds of years ago. The tree peony, *Paeonia moutan*, is a native of China. This peony, more than any other flower, has been the glory and pride of the Chinese for nearly 1,500 years and has been a subject for their painters and a theme for their poets. In China for more than 1,000 years a record has been kept of the percentage of seedlings of this peony and their characteristics. Its great beauty and fragrance made it centuries ago the favorite flower of China's emperors, and it was called Hwa Wang—king of flowers.—Suburban Life.

BEET PULP SHIPPED IN

Preparation Found Desirable for Feed to Stock of Various Kinds

One of the latest things in the nature of feed is dry beet pulp. It is said that it takes twenty tons of the green material to make one ton of the dry product and that it has proved one of the best feeds for milk cows. Snook brothers are importing a car of this kind of feed from Los Angeles and will have it on the market within the course of this week. They state that when moistened the feed will assume the bulk it had before dried. Most of the agricultural schools have experimented with the by-products of the sugar mills and it seems that they have given their approval to the new kind of feed. There is a heavy percentage of sugar still left in the feed after it is pressed and this together with carbonhydrates form the essential ingredients.

Snook brothers have had a busy season in other lines, importing as many as 15 cars of cement and four cars of wall plaster. Seven cars of flour from outside points have been handled by them in addition to a large quantity of hay and grain. These figures to some extent represent the work of the firm of Clark & Snook before they dissolved partnership.

BANK DIRECTORS HOPEFUL

Defunct First-Second National of Pittsburg May Be Revived

Pittsburg, Pa., Nov. 11.—Stockholders of the First-Second National bank in this city, closed last summer by order of the assistant comptroller of the currency at Washington, met today to ratify plans for the re-opening of the institution. At a meeting the two-thirds of the directorate held here on October 10 sentiment for reopening was unanimous. A satisfactory plan to the federal authorities has already been agreed upon and a two-thirds vote of ratification by the 360 stockholders will remove the last bar to resumption.
