

EVANS CASE AFFIRMED IN SUPREME COURT TUESDAY

Evans needs not become a part of hoe; lower court (Judge Anderson) Lostine, according to an opinion of the supreme court. Some time ago Judge Knowles of this district held improper the proceedings whereby the town of Lostine attempted to embrace the town of Evans, which is on the Wallowa branch, whereas Lostine is not. The case was appealed and yesterday the supreme court affirmed the lower court. Among the cases from Union and Wallowa counties to be decided yesterday, four or five upholding the lower court were:

W. H. Stanchfield Warehouse company, appellant, vs. Central Railroad of Oregon; appealed from Union; suit for damages; affirmed.

Charles H. Malzer vs. Henry Schisler, appellant; appealed from Wallowa; action for money; affirmed.

Mrs. A. E. Ivanhoe vs. F. S. Ivanhoe; appealed from Wallowa; suit for money; affirmed.

Little Store on Jefferson Changes Hands After Long Career

F. W. Hambel, who has conducted a little grocery store on East Jefferson avenue for nearly a quarter of a century, has disposed of his place of business to Ben Bassett, formerly connected with the Palmer Lumber company and later located in Washington, where he found things unsatisfactory and decided to make La Grande his home. Mr. Hambel has in mind a trip to California for his health, when he has arranged his business affairs to permit such action.

Mr. Hambel is one of the pioneers of La Grande. His store, known as the paradise for children with pennies to spend for candy and ice cream, and a substantial grocery business was carried on by the veteran for many years.

CIVIL ENGINEER DEAD

Montreal Residents Advised of the Serious Illness and Death

Two messages following each other in rapid succession last evening advised relatives of H. B. Feal, a civil engineer employed on Howard creek construction work for the George Palmer Lumber company for three months, of the very critical illness and death of the engineer. Late in the afternoon relatives in Montreal were advised by telegram that Mr. Feal, who had been brought to La Grande from the works on Howard creek a few days ago, was dying and shortly afterward the death message was flashed to Montreal.

The body of the young engineer was held here today pending instructions as to burial. Feal has been in this section about three months, and until a few days ago was in excellent health, but contracted typhoid, dying after a very brief illness.

JUDGE KNOWLES INJURED

Hatchet Strikes Knee Inflicting Severe Gash Over Knee Cap

A gash in the knee that missed cracking the knee cap by a fraction of an inch, is giving Circuit Judge J. W. Knowles serious pain today and will probably keep the jurist confined to his home for some time. Mr. Knowles was using a hatchet at his ranch up Deal canyon a recent afternoon when the instrument glanced, striking one knee with terrific force. He paid little attention to it then, but he is today suffering much pain. He spent a restless night, but physicians assert the wound will likely heal with rapidity from now on. No lasting complications are expected as the knee cap was not gashed. The wound is an ugly one and painful.

wards the head was beside him. The evidence as brought out at the inquest seems to have established the fact that he had first attempted to shoot himself. This was evident from the fact that the shell in the gun showed the mark of the firing pin. In his prostrate position he had tied a string to the trigger of the gun and pulled, but the cartridge did not explode. He then repeated the same act, but the string seems to have slipped from the trigger, for the gun was cocked and the string lay at the side of the gun. Failing in his attempt to shoot himself he evidently became disgusted and had recourse to the razor, cutting his throat about four inches, sufficient to produce death. But a small quantity of blood issued from the wound. The room showed no signs of violence. He had apparently just crawled out of bed, for he lay there in his undergarments. Men who knew him state that he had many friends in Kamela, that he was honest to a fault and that he harmed no one. In the pockets of his overalls examiners found \$7.10, apparently all of the earthly goods that he possessed.

He was a man who had been addicted to strong drink and it is the supposition that years of indulgence had finally robbed him of the stamina to withstand the temptation to do away with himself. He is said to have a son in Breckenridge, Colo., but no one knows his name nor his definite whereabouts. The body was buried in Kamela. Arthur C. Williams and Constable I. W. Faulk of La Grande attended the inquest. Six men from Kamela composed the body of inquiry, besides those mentioned. The proceedings were held in the cabin where the act was committed.
