PALMER MILL KILN CURES

pipes. On the outside of the building are little windows or peepholes in which a Lyondyke, an instrument used for the purpose of determining the moisture in the kilns, and a self-registering thermometer are located. The former shows how the process of drying is progressing and the latter shows the amount of heat actually in the room. This thermometer is constructed like a government weather thermometer and registers

day by day, hourly in fact, the exact degree of temperature for each hour. In this way it is impossible for a negligent employe to fib to the management. He cannot claim that he had the required amount of heat in the kiln when it was not actually there.

When the requisite amount of heat is turned on the wood begins to shed its moisture, in fact the water will sweat out of it just as it does out of a person. This moisture passes off through the aspirator or the ventilators in the form of steam. The lumber is permitted to remain in these kilns for a period of from six to seven days, during which time the temperature is constant at about 170 degrees. This intense heat also boils out of the wood much or all of the resin and reduces the weight of the lumber more than 50 per cent.

Different woods require different processes and no two kilns will work alike. At the present time the company is in the experimental stage in drying wood in the new kilns and will not be able to state with any degree of accuracy just how each wood is to be treated. Generally speaking the softer woods, such as pine, absorb more water and hence the drying process will be of longer duration. From sixty to sixty-five pounds of live stems are required to heat the plant.

The arrangement that enables the operator to turn live steam on the wood serves at the same time in the case of fire which would smother flames in shorter order.

Until the entire scheme is worked out the boards are loaded on the car piled flat, with cleats between each tier of board. A new device is being installed that will automatically pile the boards on the car and leave them standing on edge. This scheme is for the purpose of allowing the water to flow from the kiln, and of equalizing the drying process. Heretofore the boards on the bottom caught the moisture from those on top and the drying process was impeded.

Another building is being erected to take care of the lumber as it comes from the kiln and in this way the lumber will always be in the dry.

It is remarkable how the science of speed has whipped everything up to this point of efficiency. The big snake-like galvanized pipe which the spectator sees running from the planing mill to the burner is already too small and the company is forced to put in larger equipment to handle the increased shavings that come from powerful planers just recently installed.

The plant is the most modern in

every respect and has a record for efficiency which few mills can equal. Not one serious accident has occurred in the mills and few in the woods. Working conditions cannot be made better and the company contemplates further securing its men by seeking admission to the Workman's Compensation insurance, recently voted into law by the people of the state. To the community the \$20,000 a month paid to the employes as wages is an item of much weight. When one considers that the salary for the year means \$240,000 to the city, distributed among the merchants and business men, when one speculates that this condition is going to continue for many years to come there is some reason to believe the city is going to be of greater consequence in the future. It is estimated that no living stockholder will see the last tree owned by the company felled. That means another generation of usefulness for the company and money and business for the city.

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Do You Comply With the BUTTER LAW?

If not, read the following law and have your Butter Wrappers nicely printed, with your name and weight of butter thereon.

CAUTION!

CHAPTER 179, SECTION 3.

"It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association or corporation to sell, offer or expose for sale, any short weight butter within the State of Oregon. All butter sold or exposed or offered for sale in rolls, prints or squares within the State of Oregon, shall be plainly marked: 'Eight ounces, full weight,' sixteen ounces, full weight,' 'twenty-four ounces full weight,' or 'thirty-two ounces, full weight,' every roll, print or square sold, offered or exposed for sale shall contain the number of ounces marked thereon; and any person, firm, association or corporation violating any of the provisions of this act, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine or not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$100.00, or by imprisonment in the county jail for not less than six months; or both such fine and imprisonment."
