## KNIGHTS WIN FRESH LAURELS

**EXEMPLIFICATION OF RITUAL  
WORK PLEASES ALL**

Second and Third Degrees Exemplified at Pendleton Lodge Fest

Local Knights of Columbus covered themselves with glory at the initiation exercises at Pendleton yesterday when a class of fifty were received into the order. The first degree was exemplified by the Walla Walla council and the home council put on the second in an able manner, although it was their first attempt. But the bulk of honors go to the local council for the perfection and the real skill shown in the exemplification of the third degree, which is the most important and most difficult. Jack Pearce, as district deputy, and Jim Corbett, as captain, bore the brunt of the work and were ably assisted by Martin King, Wm. Pearce, R. J. Sullivan, Leo Klees, John Clifford and J. A. Hadeller. Sixty men were in attendance from La Grande.

The degree work was preceded by services at the Catholic church at which His Lordship Rt. Rev. T. J. O'Reilly officiated. After the initiation a sumptuous banquet was served. Father Driscoll made the speech of the evening and proved to be one of the biggest boosters for the Knights of La Grande and the city in general. He was lustily cheered upon the conclusion of his speech and was congratulated by the bishop. Prof. Molitor of the Pendleton choir sang several numbers and was called back to repeat. J. A. Hadeller of this city also participated in the entertainment and sang two songs. It was one of the most successful affairs ever staged in this part of the state and the people of Pendleton promised local officers that they would turn out en masse when La Grande exemplified the work early in the coming year. A friendly spirit of rivalry has commenced and both of the councils will strive to outdo the other in the work for which the order was instituted. Pendleton has some eighty members and the local council over 200.

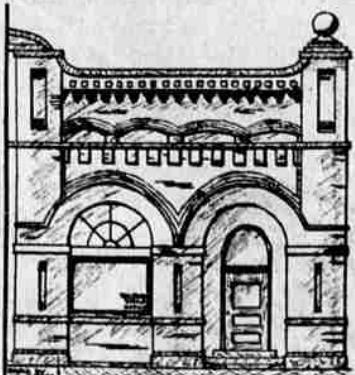
### Wenzel Family Returns

The above sketch, reproducing the present quarters, has been neatly gotten up with a reminder sent out by Treasurer Aug. J. Stange of the Y. M. C. A. directors, calling attention to the fact that "This sketch shows the present office of the Y. M. C. A., located in the United States bank building, entrance on Depot street."

It is significant that almost on the day that this reminder was sent out, youngsters cleaned off the site for workmen to pile their sand and material with which to build the new institution, alongside of which, the cramped office room around which hinges La Grande's Y. M. C. A. will appear as a relic of the old days.

Such a joy as this is needed to make a man capable of inheriting eternity here and hereafter, for it raises man above the merely mortal and invests him with energy to pursue the tasks that are without end and fills him with a desire to ally himself with the powers that build the beauty of a continuing world.—St. Paul Pioneer Press.

### SILENCED BY A LOOK.

Gladstone's Burning Eyes Rendered Blackie Speechless.

Gladstone had peculiar, eagle-like eyes. At a dinner at which he and Professor Blackie were present the two men were opposite, and when Gladstone gave in a forcible way his idea that Homer was no longer recited, but chanted, the professor cried out, "Mr. Gladstone, I don't believe a word of it!" Then he rose to argue the matter and said one sentence, but got no further. He had met Gladstone's gaze and seen his outer eyelids widened to their fullness in a steady glare, and his tongue stumbled, and he sank back into his chair in confusion. The writer concludes:

"Go to the zoo for it. Take your umbrella. Make your way to the place where eagles, vultures, falcons and such like creatures blink on their perches. Select a bird. Stare at him with insult and you will see the outer lids expand as Mr. Gladstone's did. Poke at him with your umbrella. The filmy vertical lids through which he looks at the sun and opens to paralyze his prey will part, and then you will see what Blackie saw and understand his feelings."

### When Britain Fought For an Ear.

Perhaps the most extraordinary example of Britain going to war for "no reason at all" occurred in the reign of George II. One Robert Jenkins, an English merchant-captain, trading from Jamaica, arriving in England in 1738, reported that the sloop had been boarded by the Spanish coast guards and that though no proof of smuggling had been found, he had been tortured and his ear torn off. All England flew into a quiver. "Jenkins' ear" divided parties and shook Walpole's ministry. The house of commons sent for Jenkins, and he was told to bring his ear with him. The incident grew into a crisis, though Walpole did his best to persuade people to keep their heads, but the popular indignation was so great that the next year the government was compelled to declare war against Spain.—Pearson's.

### The Isle of Yachts.

Cowes had many ups and downs before it finally attained its destiny as the headquarters of yachting. Sir John Oglander, writing in Stuart times, says, "I knew when there was not above three or four houses at Cowes," but he had counted 300 ships at anchor there, "and I was and am persuaded that if our wars and troubles had not unfortunately happened it would have grown as famous as Newport." The wars complained of were the civil wars. Foreign war had been a fine thing for Cowes, since the war ships bought the island's produce there. But the civil wars struck the gentry hard, and Sir John adds the coming of lawyers as another curse. The first attorney was expelled from the island by the governor as a public danger. "Now peace and law hath beguiled us all," says Sir John.—London Chronicle.

## Do You Comply With the BUTTER LAW?

If not, read the following law and have your Butter Wrappers nicely printed, with your name and weight of butter thereon.

### CAUTION!

CHAPTER 179, SECTION 3.

"It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association or corporation to sell, offer or expose for sale, any short weight butter within the State of Oregon. All butter sold or exposed or offered for sale in rolls, prints or squares within the State of Oregon, shall be plainly marked: 'Eight ounces, full weight,' sixteen ounces, full weight,' 'twenty-four ounces full weight,' or 'thirty-two ounces, full weight,' every roll, print or square sold, offered or exposed for sale shall contain the number of ounces marked thereon; and any person, firm, association or corporation violating any of the provisions of this act, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine or not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$100.00, or by imprisonment in the county jail for not less than six months; or both such fine and imprisonment."
