COVE WOMAN PICTURES BEST WAY TO PLANT AND CULTIVATE

The first thing in cherry growing, is the same as in any other crop. Good ground, plowed very deep, well disked and harrowed and when the ground is in good enough condition to plant garden in then it is good enough to plant trees. The selection of trees is a very important part. Although the small yearling trees make a good growth, we prefer the six foot yearlings, which, I think will come into bearing much sooner than the smaller ones; it is money well spent to get the larger trees.

Trees should be planted at least twenty-five feet apart, thirty is better, either square or diagonally. They should be planted very straight as it is easier cultivating and looks so much better. A great fault in all the older orchards, is too close planting, so that when the trees are full grown, it is almost impossible to drive between them, neither can the sun shine in.

Before the trees come into bearing, almost any kind of vegetables, potatoes or strawberries, can be grown between the rows, with profit. I would prefer anything to strawberries, as they require more water than is good for the trees, and taking too much fertility from the soil.

After four or five years the trees should have the ground to themselves, and fertilizer added occasionally, in the way of barn yard manure, a clover crop or potash.

Keep up the fertility, cultivate well always and there will soon be lots of cherries.

The cost of six foot trees, preparing the ground and planting is about fifty dollars per acre. Trees come into full bearing at about ten to twelve years. Although they bear some at two or three years.

About the profit. The average this year was from five to ten ton per acre, some better, according to the age of the trees and their care. The output from Cove is estimated at six hundred and fifty ton this year.

Royal Annes sold for \$65 a ton and

Blacks at \$60 to the cannery. As they are about equally divided, the average price would be \$62.50 per ton. This would be from three to six hundred dollars per acre. But this is far from all profit. It takes just one-third of the crop to pay for picking and hauling to town. Count up the taxes, the interest on your land value, your work in caring for the orchard and it takes almost the second third. Nevertheless, of the tree bearing fruits we think the cherry the most profitable.

The Cove Commercial Club has on the Cherry Fair Envelopes and pennants, a bunch of cherries and printed under them, "Cove got 'em."

Does the Cherry Fair pay? I think so as it has done more to advertise Cove than any other one thing.

Can I prove to you that Cove is the place to grow cherries? Some of the largest commission houses in the United States have said that no other section any where, grows cherries to equal Cove.

Are gold medals of any value? Cove cherries received the first prize at Buffalo, N. Y. in 1901. The gold medals in 1904 at St. Louis, in 1905 at Portland, and in 1909 at Seattle. Keep an eye open for the gold medal in 1915. Cove will be there. Let us plant more cherries. Increase the acreage for the prospects are bright for a cannery in this valley in the near future. Then the price will no doubt increase. Elgin has her apples, Imbler has her pears, Alice her wheat fields, Union her prunes and horse show, La Grande her mills and the County Fair, but for cherries, "Cove's got 'em."
