J. D. Casey of the Casey Lumber company came in from Meacham this morning and will transact business between trains.

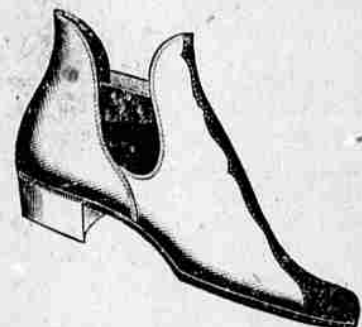
