The "Forbidden Fruit"			
Why the apple has been spoken of as the fruit that was forbidden in the Garden of Eden is one of the great puzzles of biblical scholars. In Genesis III, where the incident of the eating of this fruit of the "Tree of Knowledge of Good and Evil," is mentioned, no name whatever is given to that fruit. All that is said is; "And when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was pleasant to the eyes, and a tree to be desired to make one wise, she took of the fruit thereof, and did eat, and gave also unto her husband with her; and he did eat." (Verse 6.)			
In fact, scholars doubt very seriously whether it was the apple at all. They suggest that all evidence points to it having been the quince, the fragrance of which was held in the highest esteem by the Orientals. Another point in favor of the quince is that it is the fruit which was sacred to Venus, the goddess of love, and in a great many of the ancient writings the quince is very frequently mentioned in this manner. In Babylonia Ishtar took the place of Venus in the Roman mythology, and it should be remembered that that story of the creation originated with the Babylonians. All evidence seem to point away from the apple having been the "forbidden fruit," and toward the quince as having been the fruit of the "Tree of Knowledge of Good and Evil."
