MOUNT GLENN MAN FINDS THE BUSINESS PROFITABLE

Ducks and Chickens Do Not Pay as Well as Big Hare Ranch

Mt. Glenn, Nov. 26.—(Special)—Parley Feik, the 15-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Feik, is counting up his fine bunch of Belgian hares for the Thanksgiving market. Parley has been experimenting with chickens and ducks for more than two years and now he has solved the problem and out of all his experience has found that his hares are more profitable than either the chickens or ducks. Parley says it takes double the time and care to mature a bunch of chickens or ducks for the market as it does his rabbits, and as his rabbits increase so rapidly it is more profitable for him to raise the latter, so the young lad is going into the business on a larger scale. He has a ready market at 50c each. He also intends to prepare several acres of alfalfa in the spring on which to establish his rabbits.
