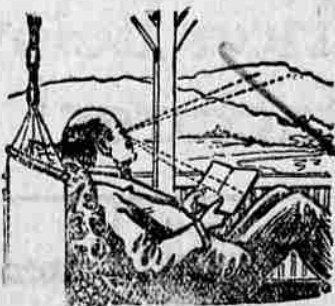

SERIOUS QUARREL ABOUT FOOTBALL

Army Officers' Attack on Game Causes Trouble.

TOWNSLEY ASSAILS SPORT.

Commandant of United States Military Academy Says Gridiron Pastime "Serves No Good Purpose," and Surgeon General Stokes Now Indorses His Stand.

Colonel Clarence Townsley, commandant of the United States Military Academy at West Point, assails football as a great menace to athletes and especially to the cadets of Uncle Sam. He suggests that the frequency of injuries to football players and the permanent character of many of such injuries make it a question of whether football is of sufficient value to the corps to warrant its continuance and the tremendous expenditure of time and money involved.

According to the colonel, of the sixty-one injuries due to football and treated at the hospital at West Point from Sept. 1 to Nov. 30 last year eleven were of a character liable to cause future trouble—that is, 18 per cent of the injuries were of a serious nature. Colonel Townsley says:

"Football certainly serves no good purpose in the physical development of training the corps, as it is voluntary and attracts to its squad only the few who are already physically strong, active and well developed. Its value, if it has any, lies mainly in the interest

overtraining and overstraining and has recommended that athletics be regulated to avoid such conditions, that endurance contests dependent upon brute force be eliminated and that a maximum effort be made to develop a symmetrical, normal physique, rather than a highly specialized machine.

Other army officers differ with Colonel Townsley and Surgeon General Stokes on the subject and a lively army quarrel is on, one side favoring abolishing the game at the military academy, the other desiring that it be continued.

New Soccer Member.

The Field Club Soccer league of the Metropolitan New York section has been expanded to seven clubs. Columbia university is the new member. This is the first time the blue and white has ever played in a city series. The other members of the league are the Crescent A. C., Staten Island Lacrosse and Tennis club, Montclair A. C., Bensonhurst A. C., Brooklyn Y. M. C. A. and the Richmond Country club.

FAMOUS FLOWER GARDENS.

Why Roses of the Rhone Valley Are Known All Over the World.

The famous rose gardens of Lyons, France, owe their excellence largely to a light soil, an abundance of sunshine and the proper amount of moisture. From time immemorial local rosarians have taken advantage of the favoring conditions until skill and interest in the industry have made the roses of the Rhone valley known throughout the parks and gardens of the world.

The ground where the roses are chiefly cultivated is on the outskirts of the city. It is flat, devoid of shade trees and protected only by high walls at the confines of the property. The rose plants are set out for commercial purposes in straight rows, sometimes a hundred feet long, the smaller plants six inches apart, with about ten inches between rows, while the larger grafted or budded varieties are inserted ten to twelve inches apart, with eighteen inches between rows.

Nearly all of the plants are out of doors. The greenhouses for a rose garden of fifteen acres do not number more than two, averaging thirty feet in length. It is only in exceptional winters that the plants have to be covered. Sometimes the tops of the older plants are rather loosely bound in straw. In every large commercial rose garden of Lyons hundreds of elegant rose plants are kept to a single stalk for grafting. These are usually gathered by neasants in the woods or on uncultivated land and sold to the growers.—Cleveland Plain Dealer.

Liked New Tombstones.

In San Francisco a woman left \$5,000 each to ten of her nephews some years ago, but this was the condition: Her tombstone was to be replaced every two years with a new one on which each nephew in turn "should cause to be chiseled an appropriate verse setting forth his love and affection." As the bequests were in the shape of annuities in order to draw upon the fund for their income had to comply with the demands of the decedent. One nephew said and was beaten. Although under the terms of the will he was to forfeit his share for contesting, the will was so construed and interpreted that he still received his annuity, but subject to the new tombstone conditions.—New York Sun.
